## **What Did SB17-207 Do?**

- Ends the use of jails;\*
- Strengthens the statewide crisis system; and
- Promotes diversion by amending Colorado's civil commitment statute.

<sup>\*</sup> For those on 72-hr. mental health hold who have not been charged or convicted of a crime.



## SB17-207 Funding

- Total Appropriation: **\$9,428,755**:
  - **\$2M** for crisis services enhancements;
  - \$976K to create a CSU on the western slope;
  - \$440K for regional crisis coordinators;
  - **\$5.2M** for implementation and evaluation of LEAD and Co-Responder programs;
  - \$107K for first responder training development; and
  - ○\$535K for two secure transport pilot programs



### Colorado's Crisis Service Organizations













- Enhancing walk-in and crisis stabilization capacity and security:
  - Increasing clinical staffing ratios
  - Hiring security staff where necessary
- Streamlining drop-off procedures for law enforcement:
  - Co-locating facilities where possible
  - Designating entrances for law-enforcement
  - Increasing signage & lighting for drop-off
  - Providing procedural education to partners



# • Increasing walk-in capacity & partnership:

- Respite availability where necessary
- Partnerships with detox facilities
- Communication with other healthcare systems


#### Enhancing mobile capacity:

- Increasing availability and efficiency of mobile crisis response
- Partnering with transportation professionals for additional capacity

- Preparing for coordination between systems:
  - Hiring regional crisis system coordinators
  - Engaging and supporting law enforcement and other community partners
- Preparing for SB-207 related capacity at crisis facilities
  - Increasing staffing to adhere to 27-65 requirements
  - Engaging existing workforce to prepare for changes
