Dear Governor Polis:

RE: 2019 Justice Assistance Grant Formula Awards

Attached is a list of projects which have been approved for funding by the Governor-appointed Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Board and the Division of Criminal Justice. The JAG Board assists the Division in distributing Colorado's Edward Byrne Justice Assistance Grant from the U.S. Department of Justice. These awards to state and local agencies will begin on January 1, 2020.

Colorado's Justice Assistance Grant supports a wide variety of programs designed to improve law enforcement, prosecution, adjudication and prevention programs. A substantial number of the proposed awards are for continuing projects throughout Colorado. The recommendations were made after the Board conducted a formal process, including appeals that began in May 2019 and concluded this month.

A total of 41 applications were received totaling \$3,112,456. Out of these applications 36 projects will be funded, totaling \$2,498,790. Of these, 3 are state level projects totaling \$216,661. The remaining 33 projects totaling \$2,282,129 are local projects.

A summary of funding recommendations by program purpose area precedes a description of each project.

Summary:

Gun crimes are solved when law enforcement follows up on timely intelligence information from ballistic imaging technology. This technology, known as NIBIN (National Integrated Ballistic Information Network), allows spent cartridge cases to be searched through a database in order to associate shooting incidents to each other or a specific firearm to a shooting incident.

In November 2014, CBI initiated a NIBIN partnership between several law enforcement agencies in southern Colorado and expanded that partnership to agencies in northern Colorado in 2017. Since 2016, the NIBIN submissions have increased 160% and our overall associations or 'hits' (investigative leads) are approximately 27%. The proposed grant money would continue to fund a NIBIN technician to work the cases from this partnership and continue to generate a significant number of Investigative Leads for the various law enforcement agencies throughout the state of Colorado. These leads are instrumental in reducing crime,

Summary:

The State Court Administrator's Office (SCAO) and Division of Probation Services (DPS) is requesting funding to contract a software development company with a background in web-based adult education training creation. This will assist us in meeting a gap in our current training for probation officers and supervisors statewide. The training would be specifically based on the legality of search and seizure practices via the lens of a probation officer, as well as officer safety considerations and skills. Our goal is to build a pilot program for this web-based training, including pre and post training tests to gather data on knowledge acquisition from having completed the course. The project meets the 2019 JAG Goals by properly training the officers on a crucial legal issue directly affecting their work. By creating a web-based distance learning platform to train them, we will accomplish the goal of training our officers statewide in an efficient and cost-effective manner.

Summary:

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention report that traumatic brain injury (TBI) is a public health crisis affecting 8.5% of the population. Criminal justice systems experience this crisis at disproportionate rates. A meta-analysis

conducted by Shiroma found 67% of individuals in these settings have experienced a TBI. In CO, that rate is 45%. When TBI goes unidentified, inmates experience poorer outcomes and recidivate at higher rates than peers. Through a year two project with new Jail Based Behavioral Health Services (JBBS) Program sites and the Brain Injury Alliance of Colorado, the project aims to continue capacity building of criminal justice staff to identify and address TBI in 500 inmates by 1) screening for TBI and neuro-cognitive deficits, and 2) providing case management for the purpose of improving outcomes and reducing recidivism consistent with the 2019 Justice Assistance Grant goal and 3) collecting/analyzing outcome data through professional evaluation services.

Starting in November 2014, the Colorado Springs Police Department (CSPD) began submitting shell casings to the Colorado Bureau of Investigations (CBI) for testing and entry into the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN). Since then, the number of shell casings submitted and hits received have increased steadily, prompting the creation of a NIBIN program within CSPD's Investigations Division. To ensure consistent and timely review of NIBIN hits, the position of the NIBIN Coordinator was created with funding from the 2017 Justice Assistance Grant (JAG). The NIBIN Coordinator provides investigative support through enhancing investigative leads with actionable case intelligence, so CSPD detectives can conduct more focused investigations of gun crimes. This is year three of funding.

These MMB's are collectively owned and utilized in a ten county region and the use of them is based on the availability and emergency nature of the use. The use of this technology directly impacts community safety. The educational aspect of daily communication with the MMB's positively affects a segment of the population

that may not otherwise be informed.

In 2020, the YOP will engage 80 parents on the importance of youth/officer relationship building and train an additional 70 parents in community/officer forums.

The year two continuation of "High Fidelity Wraparound is an evidence-based, team-based planning process which provides coordinated, holistic, family-driven care to meet the complex needs of youth who are involved with multiple systems, at risk of placement in institutional settings, and/or experiencing serious emotional or behavioral difficulties" (Bruns and Suter, 2010). Saguache County Social Services (SCDSS) has voiced a strong need for a more collaborative system of care and in conjunction with the SLV Joint Interagency Oversight Group (IOG) additionally identified that High-fidelity Wraparound is a necessity to support families in advocating for themselves and moving to successfully exit the systems they are involved in. This program plans to serve ~50-80 individuals, including adults/caregivers/natural supports and youth/siblings through our Tier II & Tier III services, and another ~50-70 professionals through trainings and coaching (Tier 1 services).

Presence of substances endangers youth and continues to fragment families. It effects community safety and wellness and contributes to difficulties experienced by local families,

perpetuating the substance-violence-trauma cycle. The rate of offenses on the Reservation continue to be concerning with higher rates than the state and national counterparts. This endeavor will serve as a prevention program by comprehensively addressing family risk factors earlier in the service continuum to divert legal or welfare system involvement. The collective intent of FGDM is to provide systems change regarding service provision for client families. The goal of this project is to enhance FGDM facilitation in order to improve family engagement.
