Innovative Prevention and Intervention Efforts to Address Bullying and School Violence and to Promote School Connectedness Presenter: Dorothy Espelage, Ph.D.

Paint the picture of what hardening of schools is looking like, school active shooter drills, metal detectors, clear back packs, school security officers etc. How do we soften the hardening? We do this by training our teachers and adults in schools to understand trauma-informed approaches, socialemotional learning, restorative practices, and culturally competent practices. This keynote will discuss innovative efforts to address bullying, sexual violence, and school violence. These inventive efforts involve developing apps for students to communicate both emotional and physical safety concerns, youth-led student campaigns to address mental health issues and school climate challenges, and professional development training programs for school police officers.

1. Consideration of Factors Contributing to Trends in Youth Suicidality: Implications for School-based Interventions Room: Aspen Presenters: Amy Plog, Janise McNally and Lauren Ross, Cherry Creek School District

Based on self-report data, hospitalizations for suicidality, and deaths by suicide, youth and adolescent suicidality has been increasing in Colorado and the U.S. for the past 10-12 years. This workshop will present the latest

research on potential factors that are thought to be behind this increase; technology and social media, loss of social connectedness, decreased coping skills, systemic racism, and bullying will be explored as potential factors. Implications for intervention in schools based on those factors most clearly connected to the increase will follow.

2. Applying an Anti-Oppression Lens to Primary Prevention Education Room: Dogwood

Presenter: Sarah Dobson, Moving to End Sexual Assault (MESA) This workshop will lead participants through identifying connections between different forms of violence and using that lens to inform primary prevention education. Participants will learn concrete examples of antioppression education shared from Peers Building Justice, our 8-session healthy relationships curriculum designed for middle and high school, a collaborative project of MESA and Safehouse Progressive Alliance for Nonviolence (SPAN). Participants will also practice using an anti-oppression lens to adapt curriculum.

3. Safe2Tell Operations Room: Piñon Pine Presenters: Kevin McElyea and Dennis Bustle, Colorado Information Analysis Center (CIAC)

In this workshop we will discuss the overview of the CIAC, specifically related to the "all Threat" analysis and the overview of the Watch Center to include S2T, which is now operational within the CIAC. Feel free to bring your observations and questions as to how the S2T program is working in your school and how the CIAC, as a whole, can serve you in your areas of responsibility.

4. Restorative Practices in Schools: Learn from 10 Years' Experience Implementing and Practicing RP in Schools Everyday Room: Flatirons

Presenters: Jen Gallegos and Jen Kirksey, JeffCo Schools

A brief intro on the philosophy of Restorative Practices (RP) in schools, and the significant documented impact RP has on school culture and climate. Participants will practice community building circles and observe a restorative conference. You will leave with the basic tools and knowledge to use circles and conferences in your school.

5. Model Bullying Policy for K-12 Schools Room: Blue Spruce Presenters: Adam Collins and Keely Garren,

Colorado Department of Education

In 2018, the Colorado Legislature passed Ashawnty's Law which tasked the Colorado Department of Education with developing a model bullying prevention policy for the consideration of districts. This presentation will provide attendees with (1) a review of the law, (2) the new model policy, (3) a review of the research on bullying prevention best practices that informed the development of the model policy, and (4) an overview of how to implement the model policy at the district and school level within the MTSS Framework.

6. Preventing Targeted Violence & Violent Extremism Room: Cottonwood Presenters: Mariya Dvoskina, Tiffany Sewell and Lindsey Shaw, Nicoletti-Flater Associates, Collaborative Management Program and Colorado Information Analysis Center (CIAC)

Targeted violence is the intentional use of physical force or power, threatened or actual, against an individual, group or community, which either results in or has a high likelihood of resulting in injury, death, psychological harm, maldevelopment or deprivation. Individuals who espouse this practice pursue violence to further ideological aims. A multidisciplinary team is working to reduce targeted violence through the integration of existing training, partnerships and intervention programs. This panel will highlight partnerships with schools, law enforcement, and mental health professionals in the State through the Colorado Departments of Public Safety and Human Services and the University of Denver.

7. Using What Works to Prevent and Avert School Violence: An Introduction to the Standardized Violence Prevention Protocol (SVPP) Room: Aspen

Presenters: Erin Kelly and Chris Zimmerman Center for the Study & Prevention of Violence University of Colorado, Boulder and Douglas County Schools

A comprehensive, scientific approach to school safety offers the greatest potential for preventing and averting school violence. However, schools and communities encounter enormous challenges in articulating,

synthesizing, and implementing a comprehensive approach to school safety. National, state, and local university, law enforcement, non-profit, and school partners are currently developing a Standardized Violence Prevention Protocol (SVPP), a toolkit to guide schools in implementing violence prevention recommendations. This workshop introduces the SVPP key components to implementing a comprehensive approach to school safety. We conclude with gathering recommendations from participants on their vision for SVPP to inform its ongoing development.

8. Law Enforcement Response to Suicidal Subjects – Understanding Responsibility

Room: Dogwood

Presenter: Jeremy Finkenbinder, Tekton Training

Law enforcement agencies are facing difficult challenges when they fail to handle mentally ill individuals with care. The issue becomes more difficult when students are involved. The mental health epidemic is becoming more difficult for law enforcement officers to navigate. Officers are given the authority to seize a mental health client's freedom if certain conditions are met.

9. Adolescent Development Room: Piñon Pine

Presenter: Dustin Hunter, Colorado School Safety Resource Center

This session will use two popular adolescent development theories, compared with physiological brain development, to explore and understand behavior we may see among young people. Suggestions for working with students in various stages of development, from preschool through young adulthood, will be discussed.

10. Integrating Cultural Proficiency Continuum into Safe2Tell Room: Flatirons

Presenters: Mark Lanning, S2T and Lourdes "Lulu" Buck, Colorado Department of Education

You are aware of Safe2Tell, but can districts and schools implement the framework in a meaningful way? How often do you collaborate with your district's and CDE's equity experts? Participants will leave the session with an understanding of their school's culture around Safe2Tell and tangible action steps relevant to each step along the cultural proficiency continuum. Through this supportive and no-judgment zone, we'll give you the tools to take Safe2Tell, and your school culture, to the next level that is culturally responsive to your students, families, and community. School leaders will leave with the strategies for developing and/or creating a high functioning team around Safe2Tell.

11. Handling Marijuana in Schools Room: Blue Spruce

In this session, we will put the puzzle pieces together to create a social and emotional ecosystem for schools where both students and adults thrive—schools that are physically, psychologically and identity safe, filled with trust, relationship rich, buffer stress and build social and emotional skills with intention.

13. Threat Investigative Response - How to handle an initial threat and the interventional containment

Room: Aspen

Presenter: Jeff Genger Adams 12 School District

This class is designed to provide "next steps" that need to be taken around an initial threat that has been received. Using two case studies, we will talk about what to do with the timeliness of receiving a threat, types of threats, initial containment of a threat, how to interview, rights that school personnel have while interviewing, questions for threat assessment tools, welfare checks/home visits, and then the next steps needed for immediate containment of the threat.

14. Trauma Responsive Guidelines for Behavior Intervention Plans and Classroom Management Systems Room: Dogwood

Presenter: Ashley Brock-Baca,

Colorado Department of Human Services

This workshop covers guidelines for application of trauma responsive care principles to Behavior Intervention Plans and classroom management

systems, as well as school discipline policies. The target audience is general and special education teachers, school health/mental health professionals, school administrators, paraprofessionals, and others who work in the education setting.

15. Using Information Sharing & Threat Assessment to Build a Safe School Community

Room: Piñon Pine

Presenter: Sarah Goodrum, University of Northern Colorado

Research repeatedly finds that school climate, information sharing, and threat assessment procedures can impact students' and staff members' willingness to report and respond to potential threats. Using case studies, workshop participants will explore three common barriers to information sharing for violence prevention: (1) a lack of trust among staff and across agencies; (2) variation in access to schools' student information database; and (3) confusion about the safety exception under FERPA. To provide strategies for the implementation of safety initiatives, the workshop will examine: the five characteristics of a culture of safety, strategies for adaptive leadership, and models of continuous improvement.

16. Sudden Cardiac Arrest in Our Youth Room: Flatirons

Presenter: Richard Perse, Play with Heart

Currently, youth athletes are evaluated based on the sound of their heart, their blood pressure, and a review of their medical history. While these tests can help determine some medical conditions, many doctors agree that an EKG should be added to the battery to accurately determine the athlete's health. To combat this, Play With Heart launched Project Play With Heart in 2014 at youth sports health fairs with a focus on providing subsidized primary prevention cardiac screens and education to youth athletes 7-19 years of age.

17. Riding the Waves: Elementary Suicide Prevention Program Room: Blue Spruce

Presenters: Jane Lineman and Alicia Franks Gibson, Denver Public Schools

The presentation will review how Denver Public Schools utilizes *Riding the Waves* © 2017 by the Crisis Clinic as an elementary suicide prevention program. To begin, participants will review all 12-lessons that aim to teach healthy emotional development to relieve depression, and anxiety. A pool of supplemental materials that may be used to support culturally-responsive practices and relevant real-world content to best engage learners will be shared. Next, presenters will share reflections and district data following a two-year pilot period for implementation. Concluding, participants will engage in a question and answer segment followed by an opportunity to review program materials in person.

18. Healthy Attitudes

Room: Cottonwood

This workshop will show attendees the "Healthy Attitudes" presentation developed and presented by Adams County JSOC (Juveniles who Sexually Offend Collaboration). JSOC is a diverse group of professionals working together to educate and support youth and their families. "Healthy Attitudes" addresses the multifaceted social and sexual interactions that students face in our schools every day. The presentation addresses current trends, statistics, consent and dealing with situations and consequences. JSOC takes "Healthy Attitudes" into schools and presents to middle and high school students as requested.

19. The Vaping Explosion Room: Aspen

Presenter: Kevin McQueen, UCHealth Memorial Hospital

"The Vaping Explosion" presentation will describe the status of vaping nationally and in Colorado youth, along with detailed information about the known and unknown risks of vaping. The discussion will also outline the impact of nicotine addiction on the adolescent brain and lungs.

20. Informed Supervision of Juveniles Who Have Committed Sexual Offenses: The School's Role

Room: Dogwood

Presenter: Margaret Ochoa, Colorado School Safety Resource Center

Colorado law requires that all children be afforded the right to a free public education. That right can come into conflict with the right of children to be safe in school when other students have sexually offended. This workshop provides a guide for schools faced with the obligation to provide safety to all students. Participants will: understand why Informed Supervision is necessary; know the responsibility of schools when juveniles have sexually offended; name the qualifications of Informed Supervisors; and be empowered to create a Safety Plan.

21. From Systems to Students: Cross-Sector Partnering to Promote Student Health Room: Piñon Pine

Presenters: Lisa Costello, Dena Joselyn-Custer and Kim Kaspar, Children's Hospital and Aurora Public Schools

Students do better in school when high quality, comprehensive, and coordinated services are available to support wellness. In this presentation, Aurora Public Schools will discuss its cross-sector partnership with Children's Hospital Colorado to address the mental health needs of their shared population. Presenters from both organizations will describe how they have worked together over the past five years to shift system-level practices and enhance collaboration to promote student mental health.

22. Identifying Hot Spots for Students Using Emotional Mapping Room: Flatirons

Presenter: Taryn Fuchs, Conflict Center

Many students want to have conversations about dating, friendships, jealousy, social media, etc., but won't turn to a school counselor. They view assemblies and other interventions as telling them what to/what not to do. Informal processes can provide a safe place for young people to ask questions and lean into topics they otherwise wouldn't have a place to share. This workshop utilizes a Positive Youth Development framework as we address 'Hot Spots' in schools through dialogue circles with young people. We'll share strategies on how to facilitate curious conversations and some of our findings from conversations with young people.

23. An Overview and Resources for School-Based Youth Suicide Prevention and Postvention Efforts

Vaping among high school students grew an astounding 900% since 2011, and teens as young as 12 or 13 are now more likely to vape than smoke. The numbers are alarming and a cause for concern. The legalization of marijuana is directly impacting our youth. Products are extremely potent and are marketed to youth, and all about disguise. This session will address new drug trends, vaping, and today's marijuana.

Dorothy Espelage, Ph.D.

Dorothy L. Espelage, Ph.D., is the William C. Friday Distinguished Professor of Education at the University of North Carolina. She is the recipient of the APA Lifetime Achievement Award in Prevention Science and the 2016 APA Award for Distinguished Contributions to Research in Public Policy, and is a Fellow of APS, APA, and AERA. She was recently elected to the National Academy of Education. She earned her Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology from Indiana University in 1997. Over the last 22 years, Dr. Espelage has authored over 210 peer-reviewed articles, six edited books, and 70 chapters on bullying, homophobic teasing, sexual harassment, dating violence, and gang violence. Her research focuses on translating empirical findings into prevention and intervention programming and she has secured over fourteen million dollars of external funding. She advises members of Congress and Senate on bully prevention legislation. She conducts regular webinars for the CDC, NIH, and NIJ to disseminate research.

Finessa Ferrell

Finessa Ferrell is the Social Emotional Learning Specialist at the Colorado Education Initiative (CEI), bringing her expertise to CEI's work in school climate and culture, equity, student behavioral health and social emotional learning. Before joining CEI, Ms. Ferrell directed the National Center for School Engagement and the Colorado Office of Homeless Youth Services; she also served as an evaluator for the Search Institute and a policy analyst in school violence prevention for the National Conference of State Legislatures. Ms. Ferrell's career has focused on the critical intersection between social and emotional competencies, mental health, academic achievement and school safety and she is a frequent speaker to audiences across the country on these topics. A graduate of the University of Oklahoma and the University of Wisconsin, Ms. Ferrell holds graduate and undergraduate degrees in Political Science, Communication Arts, Education Policy and Education Administration.

Jenny Presswalla

Jenny Presswalla is the Regional Coordinator for Strategic Engagement for the US Department of Homeland Security's Office for Targeted Violence and Terrorism Prevention, where she works to form partnerships between federal, state, and local government and western states communities to prevent targeted violence. She was formerly Branch Chief for Countering Violent Extremism (CVE) at the National Counterterrorism Center (NCTC) in Washington, DC, tasked with leading a team of subject matter experts who coordinated US Government CVE policy and strategy and engaged American communities on CVE. Before NCTC, Jenny worked at the US Department of Homeland Security's Office for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties, leading DHS engagement of diverse American communities in Los Angeles and training law enforcement on CVE nationwide. She was a National Security Education Program Boren Fellow in Mumbai, India, has an M.A. from American University's School of International Service, and a B.S. in Psychology from the University of Florida.

Lynn Riemer

Lynn Riemer is an accomplished speaker, trainer and advocate on issues relating to substance abuse. Ms. Riemer is president of ACT on Drugs, Inc., a non-profit organization with a mission to educate parents, teens, and professionals about addictive and psychoactive substances, both legal and illegal, which are available in their community. With her in-depth chemistry knowledge of drugs, having served with DEA and on the North Metro Drug Task Force, and her engaging style she brings a real, personal, and vivid face to the issues presented by illicit drug use.

Howie Shapiro

Howie Shapiro is an FBI intelligence analyst and has served on the Joint Terrorism Task Force since 2016. Before joining the bureau, he was a school psychologist for 10 years and worked in both public and private schools.

Currently, she directs The Conflict Center's communication strategy and Hot Spot Mapping Program engaging students in dialogue around conflict and relationships.

Jen Gallegos is the Manager of Student Discipline for a large school district and a member of the Colorado Restorative Justice (RJ) Council. She has implemented Restorative Practices in schools for the last 10 years, working at all levels as a teacher, dean of students, administrator, and elementary school principal and also carries a Director of Special Education license. Ms. Gallegos has trained hundreds of schools and numerous school districts in best practices around discipline and Restorative Practices.

Keely Garren, M.A., LPC

Ms. Garren is also a K-12 licensed professional school counselor and has served on the Colorado School Counseling Association Board. Utilizing a shared risk and protective factor approach, Ms. Hoagland supports schools and local public health agencies implement strategies to prevent bullying and youth suicide.

Dustin Hunter, MA

Dustin Hunter has been with the Colorado School Safety Resource Center since August of 2017. He completed a master's degree in Forensic Psychology at the University of Denver and has worked in a broad range of environments within the criminal justice system, including juveniles and adults presenting with mental health and substance abuse issues. The bulk of this work involved juvenile pretrial supervision working with a number of systems and agencies, including schools, the juvenile mental health court program, and treatment providers.
