NEW ARC3 Develops Free Campus Climate Survey

- ARC3, the Administrator-Researcher Campus Climate Collaborative, is a group of student and legal affairs
 professionals, campus advocates, students, campus law enforcement, and sexual assault and harassment
 researchers who initially came to work on a campus climate survey that is divided into modules to allow
 campuses flexibility in survey length and content, features that campuses indicated they needed to
 administer a successful campus climate survey.
- An updated version of the survey will be released this fall based on the results of pilot sites and lessons learned. In addition, "we will also provide additional background information on the modules, best practices for administering the survey (including, for example, strategies for collecting complete, high-quality responses), and scoring recommendations. "
- Today, many campuses are developing climate surveys in-house or contracting with outside companies to develop surveys for them. Costs can climb well over \$60,000 to purchase surveys. ARC3 hopes that by developing an adaptable, research-based, free survey, colleges and universities will be able to use this resource to address their need for a climate survey.

Bill to Protect all Homeless Youth Introduced in the U.S. House

- Congressman Dave Reichert (WA-8) and Congressman John Yarmuth (KY-3) introduced H.R. 1779, the Runaway and Homeless Youth and Trafficking Prevention Act, to reauthorize the Runaway and Homeless Youth Act (RHYA).
- The reauthorization for the first time recognizes the needs of all young people, including lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) youth experiencing homelessness.
- RHYA is our nation's only federal law that specifically funds vital services for homeless youth, including street outreach, basic shelter, and transitional living programs
- Research continues to show that while LGBT youth make up just seven percent of the general youth population, they comprise 40 percent of the 1.6 million youth that are homeless in America each year.
