- Safe Schools Month National Calendar Launched
- SafeSchoolsMonth.org is the official national calendar of all Safe Schools Month activities. Launched today by the Colorado School Safety Task Force working with Senator Ellen Roberts, the online calendar is freely accessible to the public and allows registered subscribers to post their upcoming school safety events planned for October and beyond. SafeSchoolsMonth.org covers conferences, trainings, book launches, the release of new resources and lesson plans, scheduled drills and exercises, print and broadcast features, new technology presentations, funding opportunities, and more.
- As we have announced earlier, Colorado is launching a national initiative to establish October as Safe Schools Month. On the last day of this year's session, the General Assembly unanimously passed and co-sponsored Senate Joint Resolution 14-031, designating October as "Safe Schools Month" in Colorado, with copies of the resolution going to the White House and several members of the U.S. Cabinet. SJR14-031 covers

the full spectrum of what we all do to create safe learning environments, and invites everyone to join a month-long national conversation on school safety.

- **Course Description:** CO-SHARE is a new Google System for public health emergency preparedness. The system is for public health, medical and emergency preparedness partners in the State of Colorado. The site has 3 key components: 1) Collaboration and preparedness page for partners to share various documents, trainings, after-action reports, and other tools to assist with emergency planning and preparedness, 2) Integration with CDPHE's health alert and emergency notification system so partners can search and alert key stake holders during events that threaten public health, 3) A grant/contact progress reporting page for contractors of CDPHE to report progress on the completion of work plan deliverables as well as communication with CDPHE program and fiscal staff for assistance.
- **Course Objectives:** This training will teach learners how use various CO-SHARE features such as: Obtaining access, navigating CO-SHARE, utilizing the document library, utilizing the calendar, utilizing the directory, and reporting progress on grant deliverables.

NEW Webinar to Explore Leveraging Social Security Title IV-E To Support Juvenile Justice Programs

- August 21, 2014 3:00pm ET registration
- The <u>Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)</u>, and the <u>Coalition for Juvenile Justice</u> present "Using Title IV-E for Juvenile Justice: The Multnomah County Experience". This <u>free</u> webinar focuses on how jurisdictions can leverage Title IV-E of the Social Security Act to support home and community-based programs and services in their juvenile justice system.

NEW Responding to a Disaster: Skills for Psychological Recovery (SPR)

This is an evidence-informed skills-building intervention for survivors and responders who are exhibiting distress weeks to months after a disaster or emergency. SPR is intended to help survivors identify their most pressing current concerns and teach them the skills so they can better address those needs.
- The skills used in SPR include enhancing problem-solving abilities, increasing positive activities, managing distressing reactions, promoting helpful thinking, and building healthy social connections. SPR can be conducted in one visit or ideally in multiple contacts in diverse settings.

 - The results of the pilot study below using a human brain curriculum with students and parents, found that it was possible to strengthen continued prevention of alcohol and drug use, bullying conduct, and suicide attempt or completion. Directly post-program, and at 3 years post-program follow-up, none of the

participants had initiated alcohol or drug use, bullying conduct, or suicide attempt or completion. There were no gender differences.

NEW Implementation of Changes to the Clery Act Made by the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013 (VAWA)

- This document provides guidance to Institutions of Higher Education regarding their responsibility to comply with Section 485(f) (also known as the Clery Act) of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended by VAWA before final regulations are effective.
- The statute requires institutions to compile statistics for incidents of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking, and to include certain policies, procedures and programs pertaining to these incidents in their annual security reports (ASRs).

The tool, a 30-topic questionnaire that was tested by service providers and validated by Vera researchers, is the result of a two-year study funded by the National Institute of Justice.
