THE DIRECTOR'S CORNER

Greetings:

Changes at CDPS: The Colorado Department of Public Safety is pleased to be welcoming our new Executive Director, Stan Hilkey, appointed by Governor Hickenlooper on May 8. Director Hilkey is currently the sheriff in Mesa County and will bring to his new job more than 28 years of public safety experience in the criminal justice system involving areas such as patrol operations, investigations and critical incident management. The Center and the rest of the Department will welcome Director Hilkey to CDPS on June 16.

U.S. Department of Education, School Safety Convening. On May 12, 2014, thirty-two school safety directors, chiefs and security personnel were invited to Washington D.C. to discuss school safety, security and emergency management. Discussions centered on emergency operations planning, available federal resources, a sharing of promising practices and a discussion on "Run, Hide, Fight." As you will see further in this newsletter, more grant funding is being made available for LEAs for safety related initiatives.

"Run, Hide, Fight" discussions on May 12th focused on the necessity to allow school personnel to make decisions when face-to-face with an armed intruder but also the complications of asking untrained personnel to respond aggressively as well as possible conflicting messages with lockdown procedures which have been life-saving. We expect further discussions on this complex topic.

Colorado Safe Schools Month, Senate Joint Resolution 14-031: We are pleased to announce that the Colorado General Assembly of 2014 has declared October as *Safe Schools Month*. The resolution and a further explanation follow. Please watch for more information on how to celebrate this on our website and in upcoming newsletters.

Colorado Safe Schools Month Announcement:

Colorado is launching a national initiative to establish October as Safe Schools Month. On the last day of this year's session, the General Assembly unanimously passed and co-sponsored Senate Joint Resolution 14-031, designating October as "Safe Schools Month" in Colorado, with copies of the resolution going to the White House and several members of the U.S. Cabinet. SJR14-031 covers the full spectrum of what we all do to create safe learning environments, and invites everyone to join a month-long national conversation on school safety.

Start sending us your ideas and plans for this October so we can highlight them in our upcoming CSSRC E-Updates. The resolution encourages "all educators, community partners, first responders, subject matter experts, members of the private sector, the media, and other stakeholders to coordinate their activities with the Colorado School Safety Resource Center and to help promote a culture of school safety and positive school climate." Senator Steve King, who introduced the resolution, will hold a Safe Schools Month launch event at the Colorado State Capitol on Thursday, September 25, 2014. All are invited to this free event.

- One in five women is sexually assaulted in college. Most often, it's by someone she knows and also most often, she does not report what happened. Many survivors are left feeling isolated, ashamed or to blame. Although it happens less often, men, too, are victims of these crimes.
- The President created the Task Force to Protect Students from Sexual Assault to turn this tide. As the name of our new website <u>NotAlone.gov</u> indicates, we are here to tell sexual assault survivors that they are not

alone. And we're also here to help schools live up to their obligation to protect students from sexual violence.
