#### NEW Statewide Forums on additional VOCA Funding to Colorado

- As part of the 2015 appropriations bill, Congress more than tripled the annual amount of non-taxpayer
  money released from the Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Fund. The VOCA fund is made up entirely of fines and
  other monetary penalties paid by Federal criminal offenders, not by taxpayers. The money is then distributed
  to the states and territories to fund programs that help victims of crime.
- The Office for Victims Program will be hosting community forums around the state to talk about the results of the VOCA survey, obtain some additional information about needs in your communities, talk about the framework for distributing these additional funds, and discuss the federal requirements for the use of these funds.

- SAMHSA is accepting applications for up to \$25.8 million the "Now is the Time" Project AWARE-Community grants

- The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration is accepting applications for fiscal year 2015
  "Now is the Time" Project AWARE-Community (Short Title: NITT-AWARE-C) grants. The purpose of this
  program is to support the training of teachers and a broad array of community service providers, including
  parents, law enforcement, faith-based leaders, and other adults, who can interact with youth through their
  programs.
- SAMHSA expects that 70 grantees will be awarded up to \$125,000 per year for up to three years. The actual award amounts may vary, depending on the availability of funds.
- WHO CAN APPLY: Eligible applicants are political subdivisions of states, tribes, and tribal organizations, and
  other public or private nonprofit entities. Local Educational Agencies that have received grant funding under
  either Project AWARE-LEA or Project AWARE-SEA are not eligible to apply for NITT-AWARE-C funding. State
  educational agencies that have received funding under Project AWARE-SEA are also not eligible to apply for
  this funding opportunity.

#### **NEW** Bill to Protect all Homeless Youth Introduced in the U.S. House

- Congressman Dave Reichert (WA-8) and Congressman John Yarmuth (KY-3) introduced H.R. 1779, the Runaway and Homeless Youth and Trafficking Prevention Act, to reauthorize the Runaway and Homeless Youth Act (RHYA).
- The reauthorization for the first time recognizes the needs of all young people, including lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) youth experiencing homelessness.
- RHYA is our nation's only federal law that specifically funds vital services for homeless youth, including street outreach, basic shelter, and transitional living programs
- Research continues to show that while LGBT youth make up just seven percent of the general youth population, they comprise 40 percent of the 1.6 million youth that are homeless in America each year.

  and reach out to local mental health services or other supports.
