THE DIRECTOR'S CORNER

On August 15, 2014 I had the pleasure of attending the fourth annual Bullying Summit hosted by the US Department of Education. It was very evident that bullying prevention is now best addressed through the greater goal of providing a positive school climate for all students.

Many of the issues the Center and our partners the Colorado Department of Education, the Colorado Education Initiative (formerly the Colorado Legacy Foundation), the Anti-Defamation League, One-Colorado, and Facing History and Ourselves have already addressed in our Positive School Climate: Bullying Prevention Institutes were the focus of this one-day summit. Click here to access select speaker presentations and handouts.

Moving to a multi-tiered behavioral support framework like Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS), that many of our Colorado schools are using with the support of CDE, is necessary. Research also tells us that if a school implements a quality social-emotional learning curriculum, they can expect better student behavior and an 11 point increase in test scores (Durlak, Weissberg, Dymnicki, Taylor & Schedllinger, 2010).

But the presentation that resonated most for me in DC was that of Michael Lu from the US Department of Health and Human Services, Health Resources and Services Administration on where do we go from here. Mr. Lu observed that we need three things in order to effect social change where bullying is concerned: **knowledge, social strategy and political will**. I believe we now have the knowledge of what works, and our social-emotional strategies give us the skills to effect the necessary changes. But I am not sure if all schools have the will to make the changes. In this atmosphere of testing and evaluations, it would be easy to put the emphasis on a positive school climate on the back burner. But let us not forget that a school where every student feels safe and connected is a school where every student can perform to their full academic potential.

Responding to a Disaster: Skills for Psychological Recovery (SPR)

Implementation of Changes to the Clery Act Made by the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013 (VAWA)
