FINAL WORKSHOPS: No-Cost School Emergency Management (SEM) Training

 - For K-12 Schools: Haxtun Community Center, 125 E. Wilson Street, Haxtun, Colorado on January 12, January 26, and February 9, 2017
 - For ECE Centers: Adams 12 Conference Center 1500 E. 128th Ave. Thornton, CO on January 10, January 24, and February 21, 2017
- <u>Centennial BOCES</u> and <u>eNetLearning</u> have received a grant from the <u>Colorado Department of Education</u> (CDE) to provide School Emergency Management (SEM) training to school teams in the Southwest, Northeast, and Northwest/ Mountain BOCES regions and for Pre-Schools.
- Training will be provided by the <u>Colorado School Safety Resource Center</u> (CSSRC) with the goal of helping school districts, charter schools, and non-public schools implement or upgrade emergency operations plans (EOPs).
- Who should participate:
 - A school or school district would develop a safety team consisting of 4 to 5 people including: a school administrator (required), school safety officer (if available), and a local emergency response person (highly recommended). One person should be designated as a team leader.
 - Other possible team members could be a mental health professional, front office worker, maintenance staff, counselor, or teacher.
 - Teams trained are expected to help other schools in their district or area to review and implement their EOPs.

NEW When You Suspect Sex Trafficking

• Colorado passed House Bill 16-1224, which requires a statewide, uniform screening tool for children and youth who may be at risk for sex trafficking. Participate in the original and this new online course.



- Although these courses are recommended for all child welfare caseworkers who serve those children and youth who may be at risk for sex trafficking, as well as those who supervise, manage, and direct child welfare practices, school staff should be educated about the risks of trafficking students.
- The original course from the <u>Colorado Office of Children, Youth and Families</u> is entitled: <u>Recognizing and</u> <u>Identifying Human Trafficking</u>
- The new course: <u>Screening for Sex Trafficking</u> is a one-hour web-based training.

Safe Routes to School – Funding Opportunity

- The <u>Colorado Department of Transportation</u> (CDOT) announces their Fiscal Year 2016-17 Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Infrastructure and Non-Infrastructure Projects grant applications for project funding.
- The goal of SRTS is to help schools, school districts and local communities enable and encourage more children in Kindergarten through 8th grade to safely bicycle and walk to and from school. Eligible activities include, but are



not limited to:

- Planning, design, and construction of safe school routes for children to walk and bike to and from school
- Planning, design, and construction of facilities for pedestrians and bicyclists to travel to and from school
- Educating children, parents, and communities about safe walking and bicycling practices and the health benefits that result from walking and bicycling to and from school
- To provide guidance on completing the application and understanding the requirements of a CDOT grant, the Colorado SRTS program manager will be hosting **grantee training sessions** at various locations throughout the state in September and October. <u>See here for information about dates and locations</u>.

More Child Suicides are Linked to A.D.D. Than Depression, Study Suggests

- Article is from the <u>New York Times</u> and the full article can be read <u>here</u>.
- The research study was published in the journal <u>Pediatrics</u>.
- The study found that children aged 5 to 11 who died by suicide were more likely to have been diagnosed with attention deficit disorder (A.D.D.) than early adolescents, who were more likely to have had depression.
- According to Jeffrey Bridge, the study's senior author and epidemiologist at the <u>Nationwide Children's</u> <u>Hospital Research Institute in Columbus, Ohio</u>, these results suggest that "suicide is potentially a more impulsive act among children," which may have implications for screening in this age group.
- Bridge and other researchers, however, cautioned against drawing definitive conclusions given the study's limited sample size and the potential influence of other risk factors.

NEW National Center of Safe Supportive Learning Environments' Safe Place to Learn

- The <u>National Center on Safe Supportive Learning Environments</u>' *Safe Place to Learn Initiative* has assembled a resource guide for K-12 schools to prevent, intercede and respond to sexual harassment.
- The guide contains resources for administrators and staff, including trauma-sensitive training modules and a response team planning guide, as well as self-care, bystander supports and other resources.

Garrett Lee Smith (GLS) Campus Suicide Prevention Grant

- The <u>Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, Center for Mental Health Services</u> is accepting applications for fiscal year (FY) 2017 Garrett Lee Smith (GLS) Campus Suicide Prevention grants.
- The purpose of this program is to facilitate a comprehensive public health approach to prevent suicide in institutions of higher education. The grant is designed to assist colleges and universities in building essential capacity and infrastructure to support expanded efforts to promote wellness and help-seeking of all students. Additionally, this grant will offer outreach to vulnerable students, including those experiencing substance abuse and mental health problems who are at greater risk for suicide and suicide attempts.
- Anticipated Award Amount: Up to \$102,000 per year
