THE DIRECTOR'S CORNER

Dear Colleagues: Our hearts and thoughts go out to the families who have lost loved ones in school tragedies these last few weeks. It only increases our resolve at the Center to continue to work diligently with all of you to protect the students in Colorado. I am grateful that our legislators decided to provide additional funding that will enhance school safety. First, \$29.5 million in one-time funding for our schools (SB18-269 School Security Disbursement Program) will be available under a new grant program. Many of you have already called to find out how you can apply for these funds. As with any new program, it will take some time to set up the parameters necessary to distribute and manage these grants.

- First, the Center's small staff of six was not a realistic office to manage these one-time funds. Our Department of Public Safety partners in the Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (DHSEM) manage millions of federal dollars annually which made them a better option to oversee the program.
- CSSRC staff have already started meeting with DHSEM staff to review the legislation and begin creating guidelines for the RFPs that will be released next fall. It will also be necessary for DHSEM to hire two FTEs to manage this grant program.
- The legislation includes a number of guidelines:
 - Only schools can apply. This includes districts, BOCES, charter schools and even collectives of districts or schools.
 - The funding can be used for: capital construction to improve safety of buildings or vehicles (locks, hardening entryways or equipment), warning systems, improved communication, visual monitoring, training in threat assessment, training for resource officers employed by the school, or training in emergency response for all school staff.
 - Priority is given to applicants that commit to providing financial resources to match the amount of the dishursement
 - As the funding is only a one-time opportunity, SROs cannot be hired with the funding. (We continue to monitor
 the COPS site as grant funding for SROs is often made available from those federal partners to law enforcement
 agencies.)

Interoperability funding also passed in the 2018 legislative session. **SB18-158 (School Access for Emergency Response Grant)** will provide grant funding for necessary hardware, software, equipment maintenance and training for schools to connect with first responders in an emergency. The program is funded with \$5 million per year for six years. These funds will also be distributed and managed by the Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management within CDPS. More information will follow from CSSRC as it is released. Please see more resources to help in preparing for this grant on Page 8 of this newsletter.

Finally, the issue of **suicide** was addressed with **SB18-272 (Concerning Suicide Prevention Training)** that will make \$400,000 available for grant funding to district schools and charter schools. This bill will create the crisis and suicide prevention training grant program in the Department of Public Health and Environment with our partners in the Office of Suicide Prevention. Grant funding will be available to train teachers and all staff who work directly or indirectly with students. Priority is to be given to schools that have not yet received suicide prevention training. Again, rules for this grant program are in the works.

By July 1, 2018, the School Safety Resource Center will post the updated version of the *Resources for Youth Suicide Prevention and Intervention Guide*. This guide provides current information on suicide prevention training programs for school staff and may be a valuable resource as you plan your grant requests.

The Center also will have their latest online course, *What All School Staff Need to Know about Student Suicide*, available in July and this can help with training all staff on the warning signs, risk factors and how best to make timely referrals when staff believe a student may be suicidal.

However, recently the Center completed and posted the legislatively mandated course, **Sexting: What You Need to Know**. Produced by the Center with the assistance of our Department of Public Safety partners at DCJ, CBI and CSP, it is designed as a tool for use by the courts and schools to help juveniles understand the elements of healthy relationships and avoid the serious legal, academic, financial, and social consequences that result from sexting conduct.

Although the course was created for use by the courts, the Center added some teaching tools for prevention education. On the Center's website you will find links to the course, a PDF of the entire session with a full transcript, and links to video captures of each chapter. The strict course navigation is intended to require juveniles to move forward after engagement with each page, however the screen-casts allow for more flexibility in the classroom. Use of the teaching tools does not satisfy court or probation requirements. A facilitator's guide for suggested use of the materials in the classroom is also available.

Please know that as all legislation is signed by the Governor and RFPs are released for the 2018 legislative initiatives, the Center will post them in the E-Update, on the homepage of our website and email them directly to superintendents and school safety directors. If you have an updated email address for these individuals, please forward them to Melissal.weiss@state.co.us.

The Center will be facilitating a working group this summer to look at threat assessment procedures and protocols in Colorado. If you would like to participate in these meetings, please email me at christine.harms@state.co.us.

Last, season two of the controversial *13 Reasons Why* was released on May 18th. Netflix also released a <u>toolkit</u> with resources for educators, parents and students. We suggest you alert parents to these resources, if you haven't already, and urge them to discuss the traumatic issues addressed in the series, if their children are watching.

School Interoperable Communications Planning and Fundraising Workbook

- The bill (SB18-158) creates the SAFER cash fund and directs a \$5 million transfer to the cash fund each year between FY 2018-19 and FY 2023-24 from the State Public School Fund. It has been signed by the Governor.
