- Prevention and Intervention

 - Teams trained are expected to help other schools in their district or area to review and implement their EOPs.

Tony Grampsas Youth Services (TGYS)

- The Colorado Department of Human Services is pleased to announce the posting of the Tony Grampsas Youth Services (TGYS) Request for Application (RFA) for SFY18-20.
- The deadline to apply is Friday, November 18, 2016.
- The RFA and all necessary documents with instructions and timelines are posted on the <u>Request for</u> <u>Application (RFA) for SFY18-20 webpage</u>.
- TGYS is a statutory program providing funding to local organizations that work with youth and their families through programs designed to prevent youth crime and violence, youth marijuana use, and child abuse and neglect. TGYS is defined and guided by Colorado Revised Statutes (C.R.S.) 26-6.8-101 through 106. Funds for the 2015-16 state fiscal year are allocated to TGYS from the tobacco Master Settlement Agreement, the State of Colorado General Fund, and the Marijuana Tax Cash Fund.

Safe Routes to School – Funding Opportunity

• The <u>Colorado Department of Transportation</u> (CDOT) announces their Fiscal Year 2016-17 Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Infrastructure and Non-Infrastructure Projects grant applications for project funding.



- The goal of SRTS is to help schools, school districts and local communities enable and encourage more children in Kindergarten through 8th grade to safely bicycle and walk to and from school. Eligible activities include, but are not limited to:
 - Planning, design, and construction of safe school routes for children to walk and bike to and from school
 - Planning, design, and construction of facilities for pedestrians and bicyclists to travel to and from school
 - Educating children, parents, and communities about safe walking and bicycling practices and the health benefits that result from walking and bicycling to and from school
- To provide guidance on completing the application and understanding the requirements of a CDOT grant, the Colorado SRTS program manager will be hosting grantee training sessions at various locations throughout the state in September and October. See here for information about dates and locations.

Child Passenger Safety: 2016 Resource Guide

Michigan State Board of Education Guidelines

- The <u>Michigan State Board of Education</u> approved a set of voluntary guidelines for schools to create safe and supportive learning environments for LGBTQ students.
- Many people in varied roles contributed their time and expertise to this effort; an especially powerful source of support came from medical professionals who were influential advocates, such as Drs. Kathy Fessler and Maureen Connolly.

NEW More Child Suicides are Linked to A.D.D. Than Depression, Study Suggests

- Article is from the <u>New York Times</u> and the full article can be read <u>here</u>.
- The research study was published in the journal <u>Pediatrics</u>.
- The study found that children aged 5 to 11 who died by suicide were more likely to have been diagnosed with attention deficit disorder (A.D.D.) than early adolescents, who were more likely to have had depression.
- According to Jeffrey Bridge, the study's senior author and epidemiologist at the <u>Nationwide Children's</u> <u>Hospital Research Institute in Columbus, Ohio</u>, these results suggest that "suicide is potentially a more impulsive act among children," which may have implications for screening in this age group.
- Bridge and other researchers, however, cautioned against drawing definitive conclusions given the study's limited sample size and the potential influence of other risk factors.

Dear Colleague Letter – Campus Policing

- This letter was released by the <u>Campus Safety Magazine</u>
- This letter was written by the U.S. Secretary of Education John B. King, Jr. regarding Guidance on Campus Policing, Cleary Act Disclosures and Related Civil Rights Obligations.
- He discusses the increasing challenges faced by IHEs in light of the current social climate and "profound questions about community and police relations, racial justice, and officer and public safety." King also highlights the recommendations from the *Final Report of the President's Task Force on 21st Century Policing* and emphasizes that there is a critical need for campus police departments to engage in continuing and comprehensive professional development and training, and to develop meaningfully relationships with the communities they serve.
