## Trafficking is not (just)...

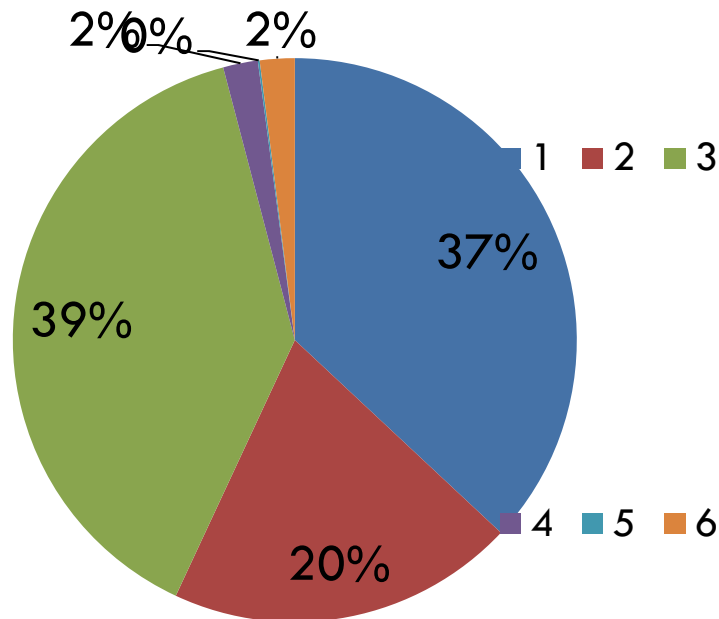
- ❑ Foreign children being brought to the US to be sex workers against their will

## Trafficking IS...

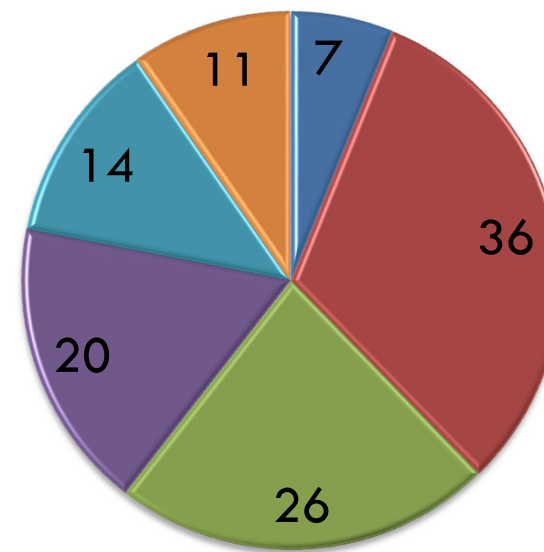
- ❑ Prevalent
- ❑ Occurring online, every day, on every app or website you can think of
- ❑ All kinds of children (different genders, races, economic backgrounds, family situations)

# How do juveniles present on apps?



- Facebook Generation
- Boys exercise less internet savvy
- Rapid escalation
- Rise in self-produced child pornography
- Juveniles don't use rational choice thinking/long term thinking
- Easily give up true names, home addresses, identifying information

# Child Exploitation Example: Jon Christopher Baker

- ❑ Peer to Peer Software
  - ▣ Sharing 20,000+ images
- ❑ Posed as a teenage girl
- ❑ Solicited 25+boys
- ❑ Recorded them masturbating
- ❑ Distributed those recordings to other child pornographers
- ❑ Victims had no idea they were victims

# Let's talk about sex(tortion)

- Sextortion: sexual exploitation, coercion through abuse of power, typically includes threatened or real release of sensitive images
- Majority of victims are female
  - ▣ 78% of sextortion cases involved female children
  - ▣ 12% involved male children
- Average age of victim is 14 years old
  - ▣ female children ranged from 8-17 years old
  - ▣ male children ranged from 11-17 years old

# Sextortion Victims

- ❑ Victims often withdraw from family members
- ❑ Can experience anxiety, isolation, hopelessness
- ❑ Psychological, physical and emotional trauma (without a hands-on offense)
- ❑ Bullying
- ❑ Increased risk of suicide
- ❑ Increased drop out rates
- ❑ Think they will go to jail and be registered sex offender (told this by some jurisdictions)



## SEXTORTION CAUSES SERIOUS HARM



**1 in 4 victims** saw a medical or mental health professional.



## VICTIMS ARE STAYING SILENT



**1 in 3 victims** did not tell anyone, often because of shame, embarrassment and self-blame.



## VICTIMS ARE UPROOTED



**1 in 8 victims** move from their homes for fear of their safety.

# Sextortion Predators

- Spend as much as **12 hours a day** searching for victims
- Have substantial amount of children in contacts on social network sites
- Keep “meticulous” notes on these victims or contacts
- Force children to victimize themselves
  
- 43 cases were looked at for victim and offender statistics
  - ▣ Of 43 subjects, eight were hands on offenders
  - ▣ Average age of subject is 24 years old
  - ▣ Subjects use multiple user names and aliases
  - ▣ Subjects often use female online personas

# What do sextortionists want?

- ❑ Additional sexual photographs or videos from the respondent – 51%
- ❑ For the respondent to stay in or return to a relationship with the perpetrator – 42%
- ❑ To tell the respondent how to look or what to do in pictures or videos – 28%
- ❑ To meet the respondent in person (usually for sexual activity) – 26%
- ❑ To meet the respondent online for sexual activity – 24%
- ❑ To tell the respondent to hurt themselves – 10%
- ❑ To blackmail the respondent for money – 9%
- ❑ To make the respondent take sexual images of someone else – 7%

# How can schools/teachers help?

- ❑ Finding the line between instilling caution and instilling fear
- ❑ Be the person who stops the snowball/be a trusted adult
- ❑ RUMINT
- ❑ Develop familiarity with apps/services
- ❑ Apply your school's rules and regulations about physical bullying to cyberbullying to sextortion

# Intersection of Schools and Law Enforcement

- ❑ Innocence Lost Task Force uses high risk victim tool
- ❑ Been in use for 5 years, 2016 became legislative mandate
- ❑ Tool assesses variety of factors
- ❑ Assessments come from variety of sources



# Identifiers

X	Three + runs in 12 months
	First run at the age of 12 or younger
	Longest run more than 30 days
	Credible report of commercial sexual exploitation
	Charges for prostitution
X	Picked up in motel or known area of prostitution with an adult other than a family member

# Enhancers

	Drug charges/substance abuse
	Tattoos/Brands
X	Truancy
X	Relationships with/found in presence of adult men
	Possession of expensive items (cell phones, jewelry)
	Giving false info/no ID/lying about age
	Homeless
X	Allegations of Sexual Abuse, Physical Abuse or Neglect

# Additional Red Flags

	Involvement in chat rooms, apps and/or commercial sex websites
X	Sexually explicit online profile
	Not in control of his/her money
X	Using lingo associated with the "life"
	Unable to make eye contact/afraid to speak
	STIs, pregnancy, abortions
	In controlling relationship with older partner
	Cannot identify address or residence
	Gang Involvement
X	Family dysfunction
	Bruises/unexplained marks
	Fear, anxiety, depression, paranoia
	Malnourishment
X	Charges for Survival Crimes
	Shoplifting/Theft , Trespassing Assault , Disorderly Conduct
