627 Motor vehicle deaths

618 Breast cancer deaths

532 Influenza & Pneumonia deaths

937 Diabetes deaths

1,156 deaths by Suicide





Sum of Number of suicides for each Gender broken down by Age group. Color shows details about Gender.



 - Female: n=63, crude rate 9.99
 - Male: n=265, crude rate 39.57
- Ages 35-64: n= 589, crude rate 27.34
 - Female: n=142, crude rate 13.2
 - Male: n=447, crude rate 41.45
- Ages 65+: n=170, crude rate 22.84
 - Female: n=31, crude rate 7.66
 - Male: n=139, crude rate 40.92




Age-specific suicide rates, 2012-2016


Suicide methods by age group, 2012-2016



Sum of %1 for each Age group. Color shows details about Weapon. The marks are labeled by sum of %1.




Suicide Circumstances Colorado, 2012-2016

Suicide Deaths in Colorado Ages 10-14 (2012-2016)

- Overall suicide rate 4.1/100,000
- -73 total suicide deaths
- -70% male
- -34% by firearm (96% male)

Suicide Deaths in Colorado Ages 15-18 (2012-2016)

- Overall suicide rate 15.0/100,000
- -208 total suicide deaths
- -70% male
- -43% by firearm (84% male)

For your consideration

Suicide deaths in Colorado Ages 19-23, 2012-2016

- Overall suicide rate 21.5/100,000
- 404 Total deaths
- 82% male
- 46% by firearm (85% male)
















Statewide ages 10-19, 2011-2015

Ages 10-14


- Overall hospitalization rate 32.2/100,000

- 73% by solid/liquid drug overdose


Ages 15-18

- 79% by solid/liquid drug overdose



IN THE LAST YEAR






YOUTH WHO ATTEMPTED SUICIDE AT LEAST ONCE IN THE LAST YEAR

SUICIDE

FACTORS THAT CAN HELP REDUCE YOUTH SUICIDE ATTEMPTS



Trusted Adults:

Youth who have an adult to go to for help are 3.5x LESS likely to attempt suicide.



School Safety:

Youth who feel safe at school are 3.2x LESS likely to attempt suicide.



Extracurricular Activities:

Youth who participate are 1.7x LESS likely to attempt suicide.






Office of Suicide Prevention

Commission Recommendations for K-12 Community

- Comprehensive protocols for prevention, intervention, and postvention (and staff know where to access these policies)
- Gatekeeper training for all staff teachers, nutritional services, janitors, bus drivers, coaches
- Established referral protocols and information sharing policies including Second Wind Fund
- Evidence-based PREvention programs promoting positive youth development, resilience, connection to school and caring adults, such as Sources of Strength
- Early Social Emotional Learning for elementary schools

Goal: Reduce Colorado suicides 20% by 2025


Responding to the need for a <u>cross-sector</u>, <u>collaborative</u>, <u>scalable</u>, <u>strategic</u> planning model to reduce the suicide rate.



Priorities:

- 1. HealthCare → Zero Suicide
- 2. Youth → Shared Risk and Protective Factors
- 3. Adults and Veterans → Means Safety and Social Norms
- Older Adults→ Primary Care and Connectedness to Community

What is Zero Suicide?

- A priority of the Colorado Suicide Prevention Commission, Colorado National Collaborative, and the National Action Alliance
- A framework for systematic, clinical suicide prevention in behavioral health and health care systems
- A focus on safety and error reduction in healthcare
- A set of best practices and tools for health systems and providers



Zero Suicide Core Components

- Leadership commitment
- Standardized screening and risk assessment
- Suicide care management plan
- Workforce development and training
- Effective, evidence-based treatment
- Follow-up during care transitions
- Ongoing quality improvement and data collection

Means Safety



Why Means Matter-

- Many suicide attempts occur with little planning during a short-term crisis.
- Intent isn't all that determines whether someone lives or dies; means also matter.
- 90% of those who survive an attempt do NOT go on to die by suicide later.
- Access to firearms is a risk factor for suicide.
- Firearms used in youth suicide usually belong to a parent.
- Reducing access to lethal means saves lives.

Firearm Deaths in Colorado, 2010-2015

For every 1 unintentional firearm death,



there were 18 homicides



and 78 firearm suicides.

What Conversations around means safety are **Not**

- Not engaging in polarizing political debate
- Not asking retailers and ranges to become mental health experts
- Not restriction on firearm ownership
- √This is partnering along shared values: No one matter your political stance, we can all agree that no one wants individuals to use a firearm to attempt suicide.

Gun Shop Project Successes of 2017

- Covered 21 counties in Colorado
- Advocates contacted 133 shops, ranges, and other businesses to introduce the project
- Of those- 71% said yes to participation
- For those in 3rd year, the rate was nearly 90%
- Of those who said yes- 74% had materials present at follow-up
- Some shops/ranges asked for more training for themselves and employees






