Evidence-Based Practices: Colorado Probation

- Probation Officer Skill Strategies
 - Form collaborative working relationships that help build internal motivation for change
 - Applying cognitive-behavioral treatment interventions
 - Reward pro-social behavior/punish anti-social behavior
 - Develop pro-social identity and expand pro-social networks
