Commission Background

- Established in House Bill 07-1358
 - Reauthorized in 2013
- First meeting: January 2008
- Initial structure, guiding principles and by-laws developed in the first few meetings
- Early focus: Adult corrections and re-entry

Membership

- 27 members
- 8 members -- based on their position in state government
- 19 members appointed representing a broad spectrum of stakeholders
 - 3 year terms
 - No member can serve more than 2 consecutive terms
- Governor selects Chair and Vice-Chair

Mission Statement Developed by Commissioners


The mission of the Commission is to enhance public safety, ensure justice, and ensure the rights of victims through the cost-effective use of public resources.

Statutory Duties

C.R.S. 16-11.3-102

- Enhance public safety
- Ensure justice
- Ensure the protection of the rights of victims
- Focus on cost effective expenditure of funds
- Work with other stateestablished boards
- Establish advisory committees that make recommendations to the full Commission
- Focus on evidence-based recidivism reduction

Statutory Duties

- Conduct and review studies (including work done in other states) and make recommendations about policies and practices in the criminal and juvenile justice systems
- Study and evaluate the outcomes of Commission recommendations as implemented (performance measures tracked on the CCJJ website)
- Make an annual report of findings and recommendations

Structure

Commission identifies issue/topic for study and analysis

Commission establishes **TASK FORCE** or **SUBCOMMITTEE** to undertake study and analysis

Task Force/Subcommittee may establish **WORKING GROUPS** to focus on specific issue


Structure

Task Force

- Is directed by the Commission to focus on an area of study
- Reports to the Commission
- 2 co-chairs are Commission members
- Commission chair and vice-chair appoint task force chairs and members
 - Additional members can be added by Task Force Chairs with approval of Commission Chair
- Usually has working groups

Task Force Members

- Subject matter experts
- Criminal justice system stakeholders
- Geographic representation
- Connection to other established groups (e.g., Governor's Advisory Council on Community Corrections)




Structure

Working Group

- Seated by a task force to address a specific issue
- May include non-task force members
- Between 2-10 members usually
- Study and analyze the issue
- Develop recommendations for task force review/approval

Example of past working groups




Structure

Subcommittees

- Address very specific topic
- Report directly to the Commission
- Members are appointed by the Commission chair and vice-chair
- Chair is a Commission member
- Usually 10 or fewer members
- May have working groups
- Forward recommendations to the Commission

Recommendations

- Presented to the Commission one month prior to the vote
 - This allows Commissioners to study the recommendation and take it back to their constituent groups for discussion and feedback
- Commission can send the recommendation back to the task force for modification or clarification
- Only Commission members can vote; proxies may not vote

Roles and Responsibilities of Commission Members

- Attend Commission and task force meetings
- Sit on at least one task force or subcommittee
- Look for common ground, strive for consensus
 - Use system-wide perspective
 - "Take off your hat"
- After a recommendation has been approved by the Commission:
 - Members are encouraged to actively support the recommendation or remain silent

Roles and Responsibilities of Commission Members

- When a recommendation is not approved, the Commission officially takes "no position" and members are free to act independently on the matter
- Commission member legislators are encouraged to refrain from sponsoring bills that are contrary to an official Commission vote
- Members of a task force/working group are encouraged to abide by these policies

Roles and Responsibilities of Staff to the Commission

- Division of Criminal Justice/Office of Research and Statistics—provides research and staff support to the Commission and its task forces
 - Minutes are posted on the Commission web site once approved

Roles and Responsibilities of Staff to the Commission

- Serves as consultant for the Commission (since 2007)

 - Working with DOC's strategic planning group


Roles and Responsibilities of Staff to the Commission

Selected Commission Accomplishments

 Started (2008) with 66 recommendations to improve re-entry and remove barriers to employment

- 12 legislative

- 31 business practices

- 19 agency policies

- 4 cost savings

- \$4.3M in Justice Assistance Grants in response to "critical issues" identified by Commission
 - EPIC (colorado.gov/ccjjdir/L/EPIC.html)
 - Criminal justice/Behavioral health Clinical Specialists
 - Crisis call center (metrocrisisservices.org)

Selected Accomplishments


- Parole Administrative Release Guidelines drafted by task force, approved by Commission, now in statute
- Jail good time recommendation results in statutory change that saves thousands of bed-days each year
- Modification of probation eligibility statute
- Modification of escape statute
- Justice reinvestment: \$9M Cost savings from drug penalty reforms directed toward drug treatment in the community

Selected Accomplishments

- Drug law reform focused on science of addiction— Commission agreed to expand treatment resources prior to modifying drug laws
- Theft penalties/financial categories modified
- Adult pretrial diversion established
- Evidence-based practices incorporated into bail practices (encouraged)
