# Center for Prevention and Restorative Justice Diversion Program Overview

## Diversion is an alternative to formal prosecution

- Upon successful completion, case is dismissed
- Pre-plea
- Not cost prohibitive

#### Must have Probable Cause

- Each case is reviewed by a prosecutor
- If no PC to pursue charges, the case doesn't belong in diversion (no widening of the net)

#### Diversion tracks

- Supervised & Unsupervised
- · Adult & Juvenile





## **Brain** Development


#### Judgment last to develop



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

# **Adult Diversion**

## **JUVENILE DIVERSION**

- Diversion more juveniles than we are prosecuting (up from ~20% in 2013)
- Reduction in recidivism from 2013-2015 for prefile cases



- **92% successful completion,** including expansion to include higher-risk/need
- 100% of offenders say diversion helped them make positive changes in their life
- 99% of victims report being satisfied following RJ

### **ADULT DIVERSION**

- Supervised adult diversion targets first-time felony offenders
  - · Assessment-based case planning
  - SPIn Assessment
  - College-aged population
- Expanding program
  - District Court launched Nov. 2016
  - County Court launched Sept. 2017
- Unsupervised adult diversion for petty and misdemeanor theft, MIPs, and other low-level charges
  - Community-based interventions
  - Collaboration with Public Health & RJ providers



## **CPRJ Restorative Diversion Programs**

## Supervised Diversion Typically 4-6 months

Typically 4-6 months 91% success rate

#### **Sample Charges**

- Open to juvenile and adult defendants with wide range of charges
- Must take responsibility for charges

#### **Interventions**

- Validated assessment to determine criminogenic risk factors and needs
- Diversion supervision to support decision-making, goal-setting, etc.
- Referrals to community-based services

#### Repair of Harm

- •Voluntary participation in restorative justice conference (when appropriate)
- •Restitution and other steps to repair harm to victim, family, and community

#### **Unsupervised Diversion**

Typically < 4 months 95% success rate

#### **Sample Charges**

- MIP (alcohol and marijuana)
- Low-Level Theft (individual and merchant)

#### Interventions

- Substance use screening and referrals to treatment if indicated
- Educational courses (anti-shoplifting, conflict resolution, healthy choices)

#### **Repair of Harm**

- •Restorative conversation, or Restorative Justice conference (when appropriate)
- Restitution

## DARJ - Restorative Justice Launched July 2016 97% success rate

#### **RJ Goals**

- Meaningful accountability
- Increased understanding of impact
- Repair of harm to victim, family, and community

#### **DARJ Process**

- RJ participation is voluntary for all parties
- Specialized group RJ process developed for substance-related offenses

#### **RJ Agreement**

- •Repairs harm to victim, family, community, and others affected
- •Builds on strengths, reintegrates, repairs reputation and relationships

## **CPRJ Unsupervised Diversion**

Typically < 4 months







# Boulder DA's Diversion Program Growth (2016-18)





# Boulder DA's Diversion Program Growth (2013-18)



# Age Range of Adult Diversion Participants (2015-18)




## **Age Range of Adult Diversion Participants** (2015-18)



# Restorative Justice



## What is Restorative Justice?



- Offender must be accepting RESPONSIBILITY
- Focus is on who was harmed, how they were harmed and what their needs are, and what can be done to repair harm from the offense (victim-centered)
- Must be VOLUNTARY for all parties

A **restorative justice process** brings together the people involved in the incident – the offender(s), victim(s), support people, and other community members, to decide what needs to happen to make things as right as possible after a crime has been committed.

### RJ isn't...



- Getting along
- Forgiveness
- Forced apologies or community service
- Soft on crime or a "slap on the wrist"
- Mediation
- Kumbaya




### RJ is...

- About accountability, harm, & repair
- Victim-centered
- Structured
- Facilitated by trained professionals
- Well-established
- Effective



## Restorative Justice options



### Research shows diversion + RJ results in...

Decreased recidivism High levels of victim satisfaction Increased accountability and empathy Increased sense of procedural fairness (for both victims and offenders) Higher levels of restitution collection

# Adult Diversion Recidivism

#### **Preliminary Data**

- 3.8% at 1 year following successful completion
- 96% success rate

## Victim Satisfaction

[RJ was] an opportunity to heal and put the events behind us.

Thanks for your sensitivity, thoughtfulness, & patience. *I'm very grateful this option is available*. I think [the offender] learned a lot.

- Decreased feelings of anger and fear

## **Defendant Outcomes:**

It gave me a real chance to apologize for my mistake and offer to help those I hurt instead of just being punished. It was hard, but worth it.





Juveniles who participate in diversion show an increased understanding of the impact of their crime on victims, the community, and their family

- Successful programs have available SERVICES and SUSTAINABLE FUNDING
  - Monitor and evaluate for quality, equity, and fidelity
  - Institute procedures and processes based on emerging evidence to support quality, equity, fidelity, and sustainability
  - Identify and address racial and economic disparities
  - Use or refer to programs using Evidence-Based or **Promising Practices**
  - Are Data-Driven and Flexible
- **Tailored** to jurisdiction and community
- **Collaborate and Communicate** with community organizations
- Diversion INCREASES costs to DA's Offices, and INCREASES work load, but will SAVE down the road, or SAVE for other entities
- RESTITUTION
- Victim and Community voice and inclusion



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
