Discussion

Michael Dougherty, WG Leader, welcomed participants and asked Maureen to provide an update on the progress by the Study Group.

Issue/Topic

Review of Charts for Sex Offenses, General Felonies, & Mandatory Consecutive Sentences for a Single Criminal Episode Maureen Cain, WG Member

Discussion

Maureen explained that the Study Group continues to review and analyze the crime severity classifications, and four separate charts were presented:

- Sex offense felonies
- Drug offense felonies (reviewed by CCJJ in 2013-- will remain the same)
- Enhanced felonies
- General felonies

The Study Group had a robust discussion of the clarity of presumptive and aggravated sentencing ranges and is examining sentencing policies around clarity.

Maureen presented documents containing charts for sex offenses, general felonies, and mandatory consecutive sentences for a single criminal episode. She highlighted the Study Group recommendations were marked in red.

The Study Group is currently focused on extreme indifference, vehicular homicide, and the mental health element of an individual's intent to commit a crime.

Maureen stated that the group continues to discuss the extraordinary risk sentencing range and consider the increase the sentencing range for aggravated vehicular homicide.

Lastly, the Biennial letter from the Governor's Office asked the Sentencing Reform Task Force to continue reviewing mandatory consecutive sentencing. The Study Group proposes the creation of a safety valve at the sentencing hearing which would give the option for the court to not impose mandatory consecutive if the following factors are proven by a preponderance of the evidence, by the defense or by stipulation of the parties:

- Defendant has no prior Victim Rights Act (VRA) felony convictions, and
- Defendant has not used or possessed a firearm or explosive in the commission of the offense or threatened to use a firearm or explosive during the commission of the offense, and
- The defendant's action did not result in serious bodily injury (SBI).
