The Task Force was seated by the Commission in June 2016.

Redirect individuals with mental and behavioral health problems out of the criminal justice system while recognizing that some individuals with acute mental/behavioral health problems will need to be incarcerated and so effective response options should be available.

Study Area #1:

Explore opportunities to <u>divert individuals from</u> the criminal justice system

The first study area resulted in **four recommendations** approved by the CCJJ in December 2016 and collaborative efforts with the Mental Health Hold Task Force which resulted in **successful legislation**.

- > FY17 MH #01: Strengthening a Community-Based Crisis Response
- > FY17 MH #02: Changes to Emergency Mental Health Commitment Statute
- > FY17 MH #03: Review and include the Mental Health First Aid® curriculum for Peace Officer In-service Training through POST
- > FY17 MH #04: Introduce Mental Health First Aid® curriculum for inclusion in the POST Basic Academy
- ❖ Senate Bill 17-207: Strengthen Colorado's Statewide Response to Behavioral Health Crises

Study Area #2:

Explore opportunities to <u>divert individuals in</u> the criminal justice system from jail

This study area resulted in a recommendation approved by CCJJ in January 2018 and legislation consistent with CCJJ recommendation was introduced in 2018 Legislation session:

- > FY18 MH #01: Pre-File Mental Health Diversion Program
- ❖ Senate Bill 18-249: Establish alternative programs to divert individuals with mental health condition to community treatment
