JAIL BASED BEHAVIORAL SERVICES (JBBS) Review

- Program Began in 10/1/2011
- Funded through the correctional treatment board and SB 2013-215 (marijuana tax fund)
- Partnership between The State, County Sheriff's and local treatment providers to serve those in jails with substance use disorders and co-occurring SUD and Mental Health disorders
- Services: Screening, Assessment, SUD treatment, transitional case management care, recovery support funding, medication assisted treatment



PROGRAM HISTORY

10•1•11

Budget \$1.4 million

First JBBS programs implemented in 24 counties.

5•1•12

Budget \$2.6 million

6 additional counties- reaching 90% jail population in Colorado.

5•1•14

Budget \$5.3 million

Expansion to 43 counties in Colorado.

7•1•17

Budget \$5.6 million

Programs in 45 counties.

6•30•18

Budget \$11 million

SB 18-250, mental health only diagnosis able to be served.

7•1•19

Budget \$18 million

Aim to have programs in all 50 county jails. Expanded population: pre-sentenced pilots, competency enhancement, jail MAT

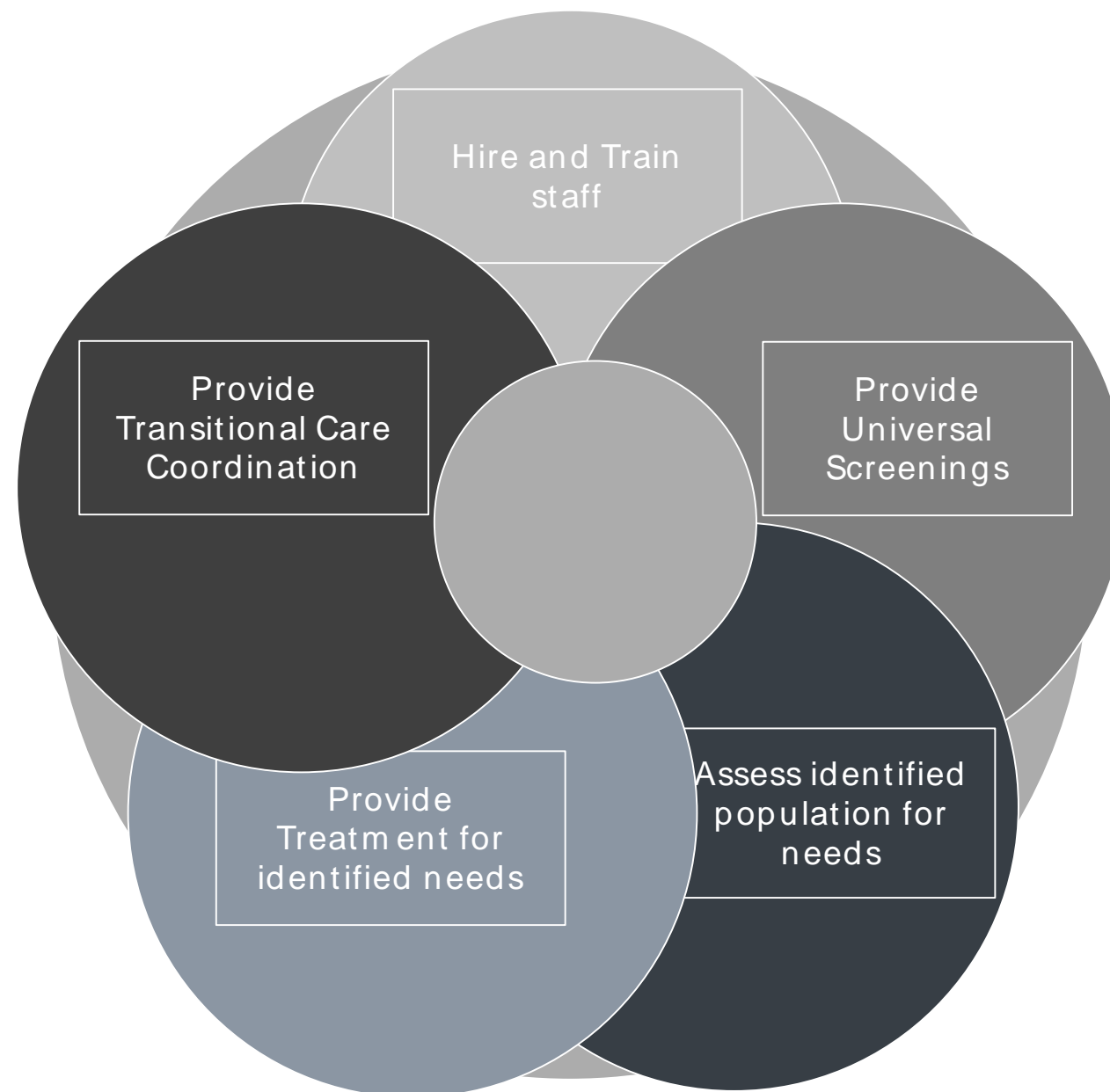
FUNDING WILL ALLOW JAILS WITH MINIMAL BEHAVIORAL HEALTH RESOURCES TO:

- + Hire adequate staff to complete universal behavioral health screenings
- + Prescribe psychiatric medications
- + Provide mental health counseling, substance abuse disorder treatment
- + Transitional care coordination
- + Train jail staff on behavioral health disorders and best practices in working with the CJ population that has mental health, substance use, and co-occurring disorders

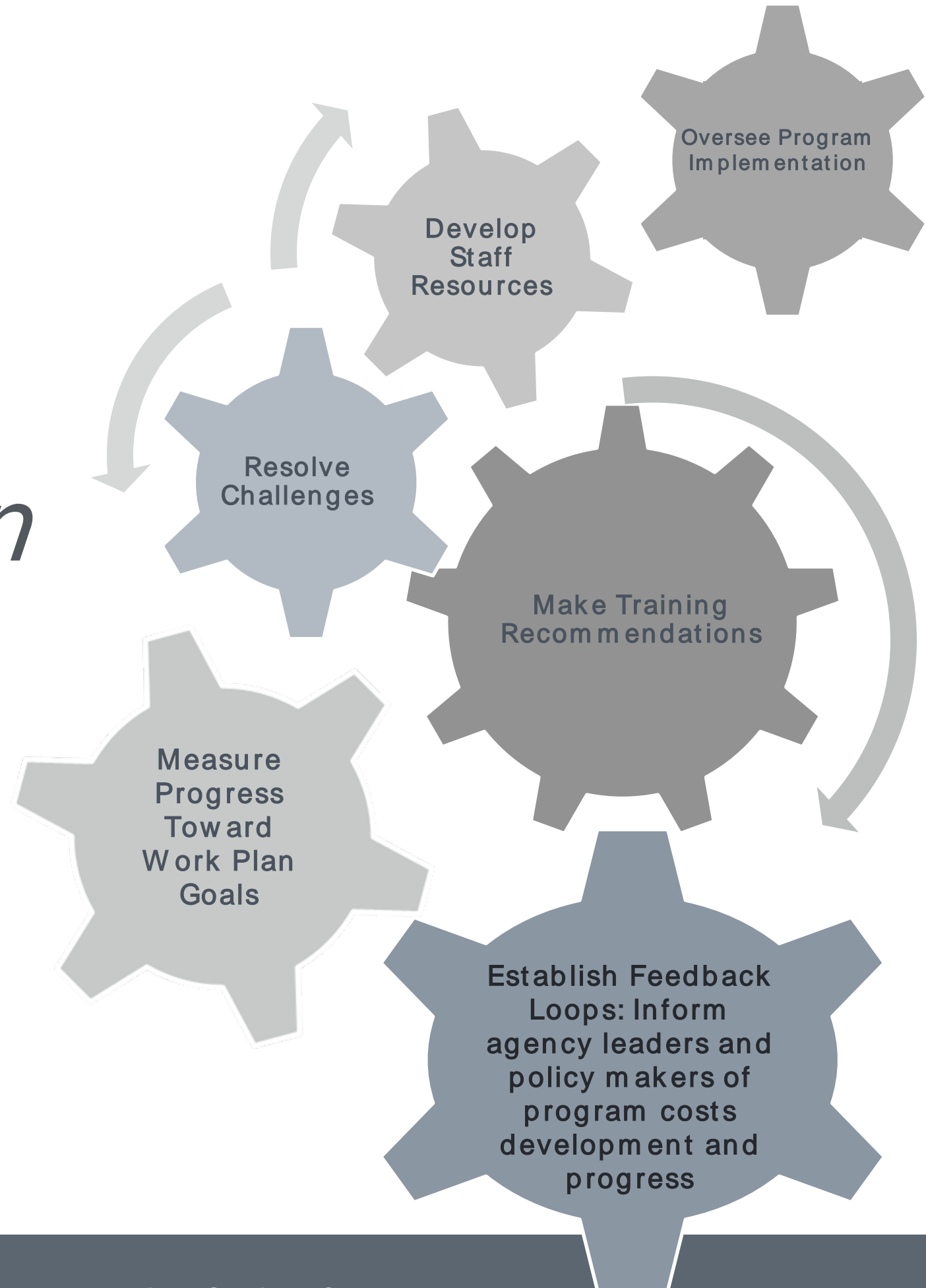


SOW Highlights Mental Health Expansion SB 18-250

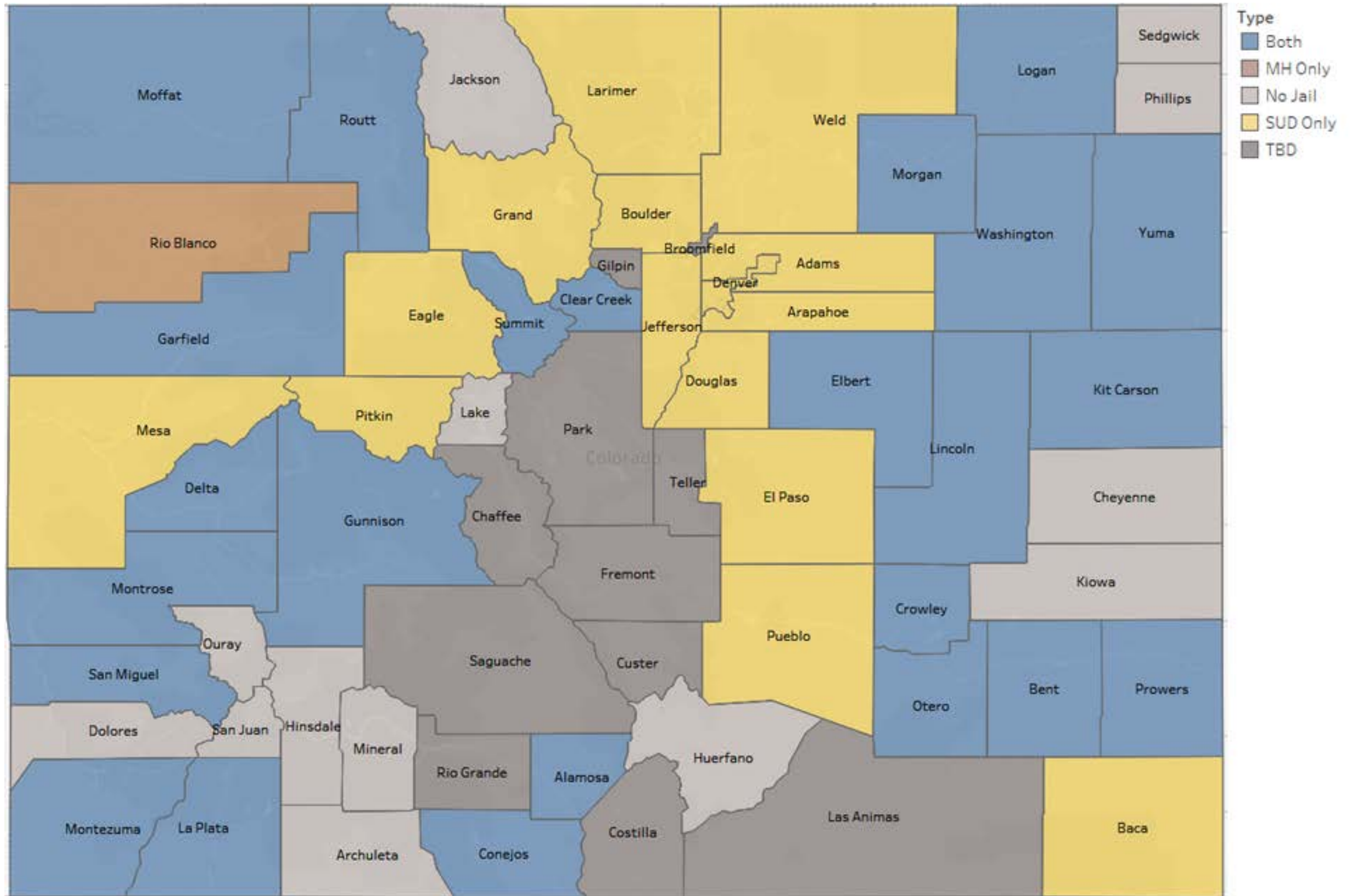
Funding will allow jails with minimal behavioral health resources:



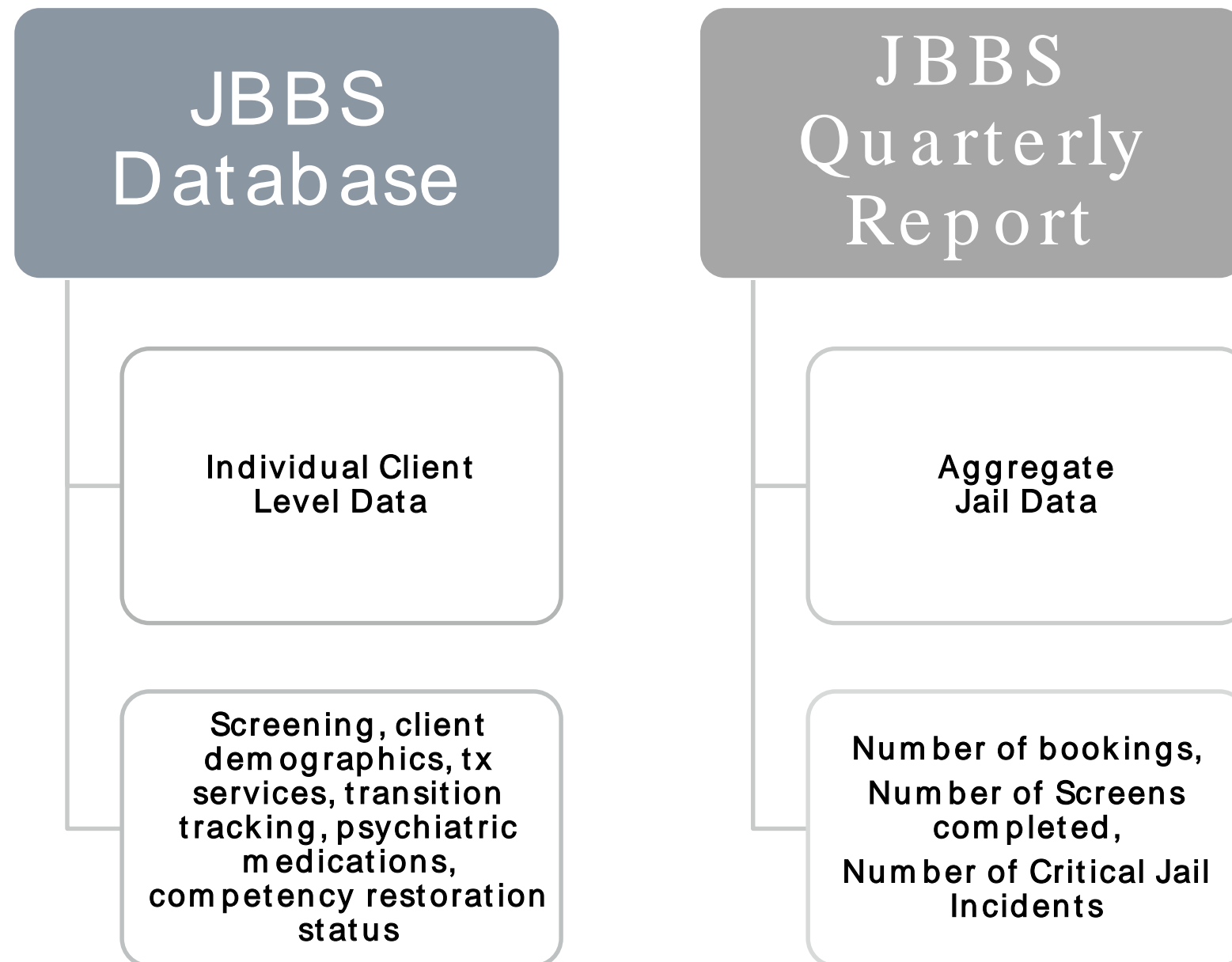

Future Connection of Jail Resources

Medication Consistency

- SB 17-019
- Standardized Psychotropic Medication Formulary across criminal justice systems.
- Health Information Exchange Strategy Development.

Competency Enhancement Services

- SB 19-223
- JBBS programs will assist in the provision of coordinated services for individuals in jail custody who may require competency restoration services.

Jail MAT Services

- SB 19-008
- Requires jails that receive funding through JBBS to have a policy in place on or before January 1, 2020

Pre-sentenced Coordinator Pilot

- 1-2 Case Management level positions to coordinate services for those with shorter lengths of stays
