# Issue/Topic Overview of POWPO Recommendation Michael Dougherty Misdemeanor Reform, which has an implementation date of March 2022, identified substantive changes necessary before the implementation specifically regarding Possession of Weapons by Previous Offenders (POWPO). POWPO previously allowed for the prosecution of anyone with a previous felony conviction who was found in possession of a firearm. Senate Bill 2021-

271 limited that crime to the 49 felonies present in the Victim's Rights Amendment (VRA). The Working Group, collaborating with CDAC, Colorado Ceasefire, and other stakeholders, found other POWPO-eligible offenses that would be appropriate for inclusion. The Working Group's efforts and feedback

Overview of POWPO Recommendation Michael Dougherty (continued) from stakeholders yielded a list of additional felonies that were recommended for inclusion. The Working Group, after considering that feedback, recommended adding 61 felony offenses to the list of VRA offenses. Specifically, the expanded list includes offenses with a potential impact on public safety or direct harm to victims.

## Discussion

At the SRTF meeting in January, an amendment to the recommendation was offered to add the offenses "Distribution of Dangerous Drugs" and "Aggravated Motor Vehicle Theft," but the amendment failed.

Mr. Hilkey asked for more information about the arguments against adding "Distribution of Dangerous Drugs" and "Aggravated Motor Vehicle Theft." Mr. Hilkey shared that he had received feedback from numerous sheriffs and police chiefs who recommend that offenses such as Aggravated Motor Vehicle Theft and the distribution of "hard drugs" should be predicate offenses under this POWPO revision.

Mr. Dougherty responded that one of arguments against adding those charges was the belief that the charges do not appear to fit the public safety considerations. While some members felt that the list should be expanded, others who felt the list should be reduced. Mr. Dougherty reported that most of the Task Force members voted against the amendment in the spirit of compromise considering the collaborative process that led to the recommendation, which represented a significant amount of work and consideration from all the Working Group members along with input from stakeholders. He also explained that because "Aggravated Assault" and other violent crime charges would be POWPO-eligible, the charge of "Aggravated Motor Vehicle Theft" could still be brought in the context of other violent crime committed during the motor vehicle theft.
