
# Colorado Crime Victim Compensation FFY 21 Annual Report Executive Summary

Nationwide, Colorado is 6<sup>th</sup> in the total amount of Crime Victim Compensation (CVC) funds disbursed though it is the 22<sup>nd</sup> most populous state. As one of only two states with a decentralized Crime Victim Compensation program structure, local Colorado judicial district CVC programs assisted more victims in Federal Fiscal Year 2021 (FFY21) than 44 other states across the country. *(Source: OVC 2021 Federal CVC Grant Formula Chart)*. The federal fiscal year begins on October 1 of each year through September 30 of the next year.

- \$10,448,475 = funds paid by local CVC Programs for tangible financial losses incurred by 8,120 victims of crime. Crime related expenses incurred by domestic violence victims, and their children, consistently account for 25% of all CVC funds paid across the state. Crime related expenses incurred by child victims of neglect, physical and sexual abuse account for another 31% of all CVC funds paid across the state.
- \$8,344,228 = funds collected for local CVC program expenditures. This is an approximate 3% decrease from FFY20.

# Colorado CVC Programs Ability to Meet Crime Victim Needs

Pursuant to state statute, funds for local CVC programs are assessed and collected from offenders who are convicted of, or receive a deferred sentence for felony and misdemeanor crimes as well as specific traffic offenses. Local district, county and traffic court assessed surcharges, as well as court ordered restitution collected, are the sole funding sources for 78% of the revenue available to local CVC programs. Local CVC programs *do not receive funds from the state general fund*, which supports other basic state-funded services, such as K-12 education, prisons, courts, and public assistance. This primary funding source has declined significantly at a rate of~17% per year beginning with FFY19. On average, over the past decade, annual state revenue collected for local CVC programs is sufficient for only 76% of the tangible financial losses submitted by victims for payment to CVC Programs.

Colorado receives federal Victim of Crime Act (VOCA) CVC grant funds from the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC). These funds are critical to supplement local CVC programs for payment of the 24% of tangible financial losses that exceed local judicial district revenue. VOCA CVC grant funds are contracted for use over a three-year period and administered for the state by the Office for Victims Programs (OVP). VOCA CVC grant funds have provided an FFY average of \$2,978,741 supplemental funds for local CVC programs.

Figure 3 demonstrates that over the past ten years, local CVC programs received an average of \$3,027,262 (24%) more in requests than funds available each federal fiscal year.

# Colorado Crime Victim Compensation Program Statutory Structure

Legislation creating the Crime Victim Compensation fund was passed by the Colorado General Assembly in 1981. The legislation established a funding mechanism to assist crime victims with tangible expenses incurred because of a criminal act committed after July 1, 1982 through crime victim compensation programs established in each of Colorado's 22 judicial districts. The statute outlines service categories that may be considered for payment related to specific crimes committed after July 1, 1982. Each judicial district is responsible for the administration, financial management, and decisions regarding its victim compensation funds.

The Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) of 1984 provided federal grant funding to supplement local Colorado Crime Victim Compensation (CVC) funds in judicial districts where local funds are insufficient to meet the needs of crime victims. Colorado has received federal (VOCA) CVC grant funds to supplement state crime victim compensation program CVC fund disbursements since 1985. Federal CVC funds are administered by the Office for Victims Programs, located in the Division of Criminal Justice, Colorado Department of Public Safety. The application process for federal CVC grant funds is non-competitive. Federal CVC grant awards are based upon an actuarial based formula used to determine the target fund balance of each judicial district. Federal CVC grant funds are passed through, or sub-granted, by OVP to local judicial district Crime Victim Compensation Programs.

The Crime Victim Services Advisory Board (Advisory Board) is responsible for the development of, revisions to, and compliance with the *Standards for the Administration of Crime Victim Compensation Programs (Standards)*. The *Standards* were established in 1992 and have been amended periodically.

### Colorado CVC Statutory Eligibility Requirements

- Being a victim of an eligible crime, which occurred on or after July 1, 1982
- Reporting the crime to law enforcement within 72 hours;
- Documentation of financial losses directly related to the reported crime;
- CVC application filed within one year of the crime; (within six months for eligible property crimes);
- Demonstration of cooperation with the law enforcement investigation and prosecution of the case (if applicable);
- Demonstration that the Injury and/or death of the victim was not substantially attributable to the victim's involvement in a wrongful act and/or substantially provocative at the time of the crime.

Note: C.R.S. §24-4.1-108 (2) allows a Board to waive any of these requirements in the interest of justice, if the Board finds that is required.

## Colorado CVC Statutory Allowable Crime Related Losses

Losses are verified to be directly related to the compensable crime are eligible for payment to a service provider and/or reimbursement for out-of-pocket expenses. CVC funds may be approved for up to \$30,000 for out-of-pocket expenses not covered by a victim's insurance or other collateral sources. Many, but not all, local judicial districts may also approve up to \$2,000 for emergency assistance. CVC statutory losses include:

- Medical and dental expenses;
- Mental health expenses;
- Economic support (lost wages; loss of support to dependents);
- Funeral/burial expenses;
- Repair or replacement of doors, locks and/or windows of residential property; and
- Rekeying of a motor vehicle or other locks necessary to ensure a victim's safety.

# Colorado Crime Victim Compensation Program Operations

Colorado's decentralized system establishes a separate Crime Victim Compensation (CVC) program in each of the state's 22 judicial districts. Per Colorado statute, victims are eligible to file an application for compensation assistance in the judicial district where the crime occurred.

In Colorado, out-of-pocket expenses directly related to a crime that are not covered by a victim's insurance or other collateral sources may be considered for payment by CVC programs up to a maximum of \$30,000. Pursuant to both state and federal statutes, CVC programs are the "payer of last resort." For that reason, CVC programs require that victims apply for all other sources of payment available to them prior to receiving Crime Victim Compensation funds.


Some CVC programs are not able to provide crime victim compensation funds up to the \$30,000 statutory limit. This is due to the significantly high number of applications for assistance received by the program, as well as the finite revenue collected in the judicial district. Figure 4 FFY21 Colorado CVC Claim Gender Demographics






Figure 5 FFY21 Colorado CVC Claim Age Demographics

### State Criminal Fines and Surcharges

Crime Victim Compensation Programs in Colorado's 22 judicial districts receive funding from fines and surcharges assessed, and collected, at both the state and federal level. State funding refers to fines and surcharges collected, and disbursed, at the local judicial district level. State CVC funds are collected from offenders who are convicted of, or receive a deferred sentence for, crimes and/or traffic offenses classified as follows:

#### **Restitution**

Restitution is based on monetary losses suffered by the victim as a result of the crime. At the time of sentencing, the court may order a defendant to pay restitution to any person(s) who have documented a financial loss as a result of the crime. Since a case must reach a final disposition for the court to order restitution, victims may not be awarded restitution for a year or more. Crime Victim Compensation Programs are usually able to provide tangible, financial assistance to crime victims to meet immediate needs within 45 days of receiving a completed CVC application.

The Court may order a defendant to repay the Crime Victim Compensation fund for expenses paid to a victim or service provider on behalf of the victim. In effect, the offender is reimbursing the CVC fund for some or all of the dollars awarded to assist the victim. This holds the offender accountable for his/her criminal actions.

It is important to note that the majority of CVC claims handled by local judicial districts will not result in a criminal case conviction as the CVC statute does not require an arrest, prosecution and/or conviction in order to assist a victim with financial losses related to a crime.

Restitution varies as a revenue source for CVC programs in Colorado. Across the state, court ordered restitution for losses paid by CVC programs is a revenue source for @ 22% of available funds. Differential funding of local collection programs operating out of the state judicial department in each judicial district have a significant impact on the amount of restitution received by CVC programs.

### Other Revenue Sources

Each year judicial districts receive additional revenue to their crime victim compensation fund in the form of interest earned on the state dollars collected, refunds from collateral sources and donations to the fund. Local judicial districts may also receive a portion of restitution payments made by defendants and not claimed by the intended recipient (Unclaimed Restitution) pursuant to C.R.S. §16-18.5-109(3).

### Federal Grant Funds

Federal grant funds refer to Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) crime victim compensation (CVC) grant funds which are awarded to the states by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office for Victims of Crime. Federal CVC grant funds come from fines and penalties levied upon federal criminal defendants. Pursuant to state statute, the Division of Criminal Justice administers federal crime victim compensation grant funds as "pass through" funds to local judicial districts through a sub-grant process. Recipients of federal grant funds are determined based upon an individual judicial district crime victim compensation programs' financial need and spending patterns. Historically, the number of local judicial districts eligible to apply for and receive these monies has been limited.

### FFY 2021 American Rescue Act Plan Funds

Both CVC, local and state Victim & Witness Assistance and Law Enforcement (VALE) funds rely primarily upon surcharges assessed at the local level after an individual has pled guilty to or been convicted of a crime. During the pandemic, there was a significant decrease in the collection of court costs and surcharges and as a result, funding for CVC programs was negatively impacted at the local level. On March 11, 2021 the federal government enacted the "American Rescue Plan Act of 2021" (ARPA) to provide support to state, local, and tribal governments in responding to the impact of the COVID-19 public health emergency and to assist them in their efforts to contain the effects of the COVID-19 public health emergency on their communities, residents, and businesses.

As part of the federal act, Colorado received \$3,828,761,790 from the federal coronavirus state and local fiscal recovery fund (SLFRF) to be used for specific purposes identified in the federal act. This act allocated a total of \$15 million to be appropriated for victim's services programs and purposes related to populations that have been disproportionately negatively affected by the COVID-19 public health emergency, including those affected by domestic violence, sexual assault, and violence generally. The money was appropriated from the economic recovery and relief cash fund using money from the federal coronavirus state and local fiscal recovery fund.

For the 2021-22 state fiscal year, the act appropriated \$1,500,000 from the economic recovery and relief cash fund to the Colorado Department of Public Safety to be used by the Division of Criminal Justice for state crime victim compensation programs. All allocated ARPA funds for CVC programs had to be fully expended by June 30, 2022.

DCJ works closely with the 22 local victim compensation programs to assess their financial needs on a regular basis. ARPA funds were used to fill the gap in the loss of revenue for local CVC programs. When a local CVC program has a fund balance that is not keeping pace with the needs in that judicial district, a federal CVC grant agreement is executed with that program to provide them with supplemental federal funds to meet the needs. ARPA funds were awarded to the local judicial district CVC programs in the same manner as federal CVC grant funds.

# Federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA)

Federal CVC grant funds are distributed to each state from the Crime Victims Fund established by the 1984 Victims of Crime Act (VOCA). VOCA CVC grant funds come from criminal fines, forfeited bail bonds, penalty fees and special assessments collected by U.S. Attorney Offices, U.S. Courts and the Bureau of Prisons. The Office for Victims of Crime (OVC), situated within the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), allocates a percentage of these funds collected to state CVC programs.

The Office for Victims Programs (OVP), located within the Colorado Division of Criminal Justice (DCJ), serves as the state department designated to administer VOCA CVC grant funds. The OVP is required to submit an annual federal CVC grant application and state certification form to OVC for VOCA CVC grant funds. In order to remain eligible to receive VOCA CVC grant funds, the OVP is also responsible for submitting quarterly and annual reports that adhere to the reporting requirements and procedures established by OVC. VOCA CVC grant funds administered by OVP are regularly monitored and audited routinely, by both internal and external entities including OVC, the Office of Inspector General (OIG) and the federal Office of the Chief Financial Officer (OCFO).

Federal CVC grant funds received fluctuate from year to year, depending upon the total amount of state CVC funds spent by local judicial districts. In 2021, Congress passed VOCA legislation which included changes resulting in significant increases in federal CVC supplemental grant funds to states. Most notably, the calculation used by OVC to determine Colorado's federal CVC grant award was changed from using 60% to using 75% of total allowable state CVC funds spent from the federal fiscal year two years prior to the current federal fiscal year. The other notable change was removing restitution collected from state CVC payments as revenue.

### Colorado VOCA CVC Supplemental Grant Funds Overview

In Colorado, federal CVC grant funds supplement the statutory criminal conviction surcharge fees collected in individual local judicial districts for CVC expenditures for tangible losses incurred by victims of crime. Supplemental federal CVC grant funds are available to all 22 local judicial districts through a non-competitive application and award process.

OVP anticipated a significant decrease in the 2022 federal CVC grant award based upon the decrease in local CVC program expenditures during FFY 2020. However, the 2021 VOCA legislation changes passed by Congress averted this anticipated decrease. The chart on the next page illustrates the role of federal CVC grant funds and CVC collections as compared to CVC expenditures over the past five years.

### Federal (VOCA) CVC Funds OVP Application and Award Process

The application and award process for VOCA CVC grant funds is non-competitive for local judicial districts seeking supplemental monies. The request to apply for VOCA CVC grant funds begins by the CVC Administrator at the local judicial district level contacting the OVP.

A local judicial district may contact the OVP at any time to make inquiry regarding the availability of, and to initiate the application process for, VOCA CVC grant funds. This generally happens when a local judicial district CVC program's fund balance has decreased based upon the difference between the dollar amount of compensation funds being collected and the dollar amount of compensation funds being expended over a period of time. This may also happen when a local judicial district experiences an incident of mass violence resulting in the need for compensation assistance that exceeds, or will exceed, available CVC funds.

OVP has put in place steps that ensure fair and equitable access for all judicial district CVC programs to apply for, and receive, VOCA CVC grant funds. VOCA CVC grant funds are considered and approved for a local judicial district CVC program utilizing the following information:

- 1. The CVC program's actual fund balance at the end of a reporting quarter; and
- 2. The CVC program's actual total revenue and expenditures for previous federal fiscal years.

These steps are followed for both the initial determination of a VOCA CVC grant fund award as well as requests for continued funding of a current award. The OVP moves forward applications for supplemental VOCA CVC grant funds when a local judicial district CVC program's revenue, and actual fund balance, is falling below the anticipated need for CVC assistance.

The dollar amount sub-granted to a local judicial district during a FFY may not equal the total of federal grant fund expenditures spent in the FFY. Federal VOCA CVC grant funds may be carried over into the next fiscal year.

Federal grant funds may also be considered for short-term and/or emergency stabilization of CVC funds in a local judicial district, such as a mass violence incident or significant decrease in collections. Antiterrorism and Emergency Assistance Program (AEAP) federal grant funds may be applied for from the Department of Justice Office for Victims of Crime to supplement available resources and services to communities responding to terrorist attacks and mass violence. 
## Colorado CVC Fund Expenditures Overview

Pursuant to statute CVC funds may be approved up to \$30,000 for out-of-pocket expenses not covered by a victim's insurance or other collateral sources. Revenue restrictions limit the ability of CVC programs to pay the statutory maximum for the majority of claims received.

The total of CVC funds paid statewide in FFY21 equates to an *average FFY CVC claim payment* of \$1,268 per crime victim paid from local court surcharges. These funds allocated to the recovery of victims can be compared to the average annual FY expense of \$26,254 per inmate appropriated from Colorado general funds for medical expenses, mental health treatment, residential care in the care of Colorado Department of Corrections (SOURCE: Joint Budget Committee Staff Budget Briefing FY 20-21 Department of Corrections (DOC) prepared by DOC Staff 12/02/19).

Figure 10 outlines the average dollar amounts paid statewide in the past five federal fiscal year for the top four compensable crimes and service categories




