Executive Summary

Nationally, Colorado ranks 6th in the total amount of Crime Victim Compensation (CVC) funds disbursed to help victims. As one of only two states with a decentralized Crime Victim Compensation program structure, local Colorado judicial district CVC programs assisted more victims in Federal Fiscal Year 2024 (FFY24) than 45 other states and U.S. territories. (Source: OVC 2024 Federal CVC Grant Formula Chart; federal fiscal year: October 1 through September 30).



FFY24 Colorado Top 5 Crime Type Expenditures



Colorado CVC Programs Ability to Meet Crime Victim Needs

Pursuant to state statute, funds for local CVC programs are assessed and collected from offenders who are convicted of or receive a deferred sentence for felony and misdemeanor crimes as well as specific traffic offenses. Local judicial district, county and traffic court assessed surcharges, as well as court ordered restitution collected, provide 61% of funds available to local CVC programs.

Local CVC programs *do not receive funds from the state general fund*, which supports other basic state-funded services, such as K-12 education, prisons, courts, and public defender assistance. Local judicial district court collections, CVC program's primary funding source, has declined 15% each federal fiscal year beginning since 2018.


Colorado receives federal Victim of Crime Act (VOCA) CVC grant funds from the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC). These funds are critical to supplement local CVC programs for payment of the 39% of tangible financial losses that exceed local judicial district revenue.

Figure 3 shows the gap between CVC state revenue and supplemental VOCA VC grant funds compared to CVC expenditures for the immediate past ten years. Statewide, local CVC programs receive an average of \$6,755,594 more in requests than local CVC funds available each federal fiscal year.

Colorado Crime Victim Compensation Program Structure

Legislation creating the Crime Victim Compensation fund was passed by the Colorado General Assembly in 1981. The legislation established a funding mechanism to assist crime victims with tangible expenses incurred because of a criminal act committed after July 1, 1982 through crime victim compensation programs established in each of Colorado's 22 judicial districts. The statute outlines service categories that may be considered for payment related to specific crimes committed after July 1, 1982. Each judicial district is responsible for the administration, financial management, and decisions regarding its victim compensation funds.

- Per Colorado statute, victims are eligible to file an application for compensation assistance in the judicial district where the crime occurred.
- ❖ In Colorado, out-of-pocket expenses directly related to a crime that are not covered by a victim's insurance or other collateral sources may be considered for payment by CVC programs up to a maximum of \$30,000. Pursuant to both state and federal statutes, CVC programs are the "payer of last resort." For that reason, CVC programs require that victims apply for all other sources of payment available to them prior to receiving Crime Victim Compensation funds.

The Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) of 1984 provided federal grant funding to supplement local Colorado Crime Victim Compensation (CVC) funds in judicial districts where local funds are insufficient to meet the needs of crime victims. Colorado has received federal (VOCA) CVC grant funds to supplement state crime victim compensation program CVC fund disbursements since 1985. Federal CVC funds are administered by the Office for Victims Programs, located in the Division of Criminal Justice, Colorado Department of Public Safety. The application process for federal CVC grant funds is non-competitive. Federal CVC grant awards are based upon a formula used to determine the target fund balance of each judicial district. Federal CVC grant funds are passed through, or sub-granted, by OVP to local judicial district Crime Victim Compensation Programs.

The Crime Victim Services Advisory Board (Advisory Board) is responsible for the development of, revisions to, and compliance with the *Standards for the Administration of Crime Victim Compensation Programs (Standards)*. The *Standards* were established in 1992 and have been amended periodically.

Colorado 2024 CVC Statute Changes

On May 15, 2024, Governor Polis signed into law updates to the CVC statute that were proposed by the CVC Legislative Committee composed of local CVC Administrators. Below are Senate Bill 24-120 highlights:

- Removal of the 72-hour time limit for law enforcement reporting
- Removal of one-year CVC application submission (for crimes involving injury or death)
- Allowing CVC programs to accept SANE exam documentation in lieu of law enforcement reports
- Expanding CVC crimes to include all VRA crimes
- Changing "full cooperation" of a victim to "reasonable cooperation"
- Allowing Colorado residents to apply for CVC if the state or country CVC program where the crime occurred is not reasonably accessible
- Adding CVC Board ability to pay towing / impound fees if law enforcement determines a
 vehicle is the crime scene of a VRA Crime
- Adding dependent care, replacement services losses, travel and relocation expenses related to a compensable crime
- Allowing CVC programs to determine the dollar amount to be paid for emergency approvals
- Allowing a \$33 surcharge to be assessed when an offender is placed in an alternative sentencing program
- Allowing District Attorneys' Offices to retain a total of 20% from criminal court collections to pay administrative expenses

Colorado CVC Statutory Eligibility Requirements as of May 2024

- Being a victim of an eligible crime, which occurred on or after July 1, 1982;
- Documentation of financial losses directly related to the reported crime;
- Documentation that CVC applicant has reasonably cooperated with law enforcement official in the apprehension and prosecution of the assailant, or, the board has found good case exists for the failure to cooperate, or, if the applicant is a victim of assault by strangulation, the applicant cooperates with law enforcement by undergoing a medical forensic examination; and
- Demonstration that the injury and/or death of the victim was not substantially attributable to the victim's involvement in a wrongful act and/or substantially provocative at the time of the crime.

Note: C.R.S. §24-4.1-108 (2) allows a Board to waive law enforcement reporting, application filing, cooperation, and substantial attribution and/or provocative requirements in the interest of justice, if the Board finds that is required.

Colorado CVC Statutory Allowable Crime Related Losses May 2024

Losses are verified to be directly related to the compensable crime are eligible for payment to a service provider and/or reimbursement for out-of-pocket expenses. CVC funds may be approved for up to \$30,000 for out-of-pocket expenses not covered by a victim's insurance or other collateral sources. CVC statutory losses include:


- Replacement loss services
- Funeral and burial expenses
- Reasonable travel expenses for a victim related to funeral, burial, medical care or mental health counseling
- Reasonable travel expenses for a victim related to attending critical events pursuant to section 24-4.1-302(2), except when the primary or secondary victim is subpoenaed to testify
- Dependent care services
- Reasonable relocation expenses for a victim to relocate as necessary to ensure the victim's safety
- Medical and dental expenses
- Mental health expenses
- Economic support (lost wages; loss of support to dependents)
- Repair or replacement of doors, locks and/or windows of residential property or other residential property expenses related to necessary to ensure victim safety
- Rekeying of a motor vehicle necessary to ensure a victim's safety
- Towing or impound fees for a motor vehicle that law enforcement determines to be where a compensable crime was committed
- Repair or replacement of dentures, eyeglasses, hearing aids, or other prosthetic or medically necessary devices damaged or stolen as a result of an eligible crime

Colorado Crime Victim Compensation State Funding Sources

State Criminal Fines and Surcharges

Crime Victim Compensation Programs in Colorado's 23 judicial districts receive funding from both state and federal sources. Fines collected are the revenue source for 47% of available CVC funds. State CVC funds are collected and disbursed in each judicial district from offenders who are convicted of, or receive a deferred sentence for, crimes and/or traffic offenses classified as follows:

*	Felony	\$ 163.00
*	Misdemeanor	\$ 78.00
*	Class 1 Misdemeanor Traffic Offenses	\$ 46.00
*	Class 2 Misdemeanor Traffic Offenses	\$ 33.00

Class A or class B traffic infraction – as delineated in C.R.S. §24-4.1-119 (f)(I) and C.R.S. §42-4-1701 (4). (Fees vary as to the type of infraction.)

Restitution

At the time of a criminal case sentencing, the court may order a defendant to pay restitution to any person(s) who have documented a financial loss as a result of the crime. The court may order a defendant to repay the CVC fund for expenses paid to a victim or service provider on behalf of the victim.


Since a case must reach a final disposition for the court to order restitution, victims may not be awarded restitution for a year or more. Local CVC Programs are usually able to provide tangible, financial assistance to crime victims to meet immediate needs within 45 days of receiving a completed CVC application. It is important to note that the majority of CVC claims handled by local judicial districts will not result in a criminal case conviction. Colorado's CVC statute does not require an arrest, prosecution and/or conviction in order to assist a victim with financial losses related to a crime.

Across the state, court ordered restitution for losses paid by CVC programs is a revenue source for about 35% of available funds. Differential funding of local collection programs operating out of the state judicial department in each judicial district have a significant impact on the amount of restitution received by CVC programs.

All State Revenue Sources

Total state revenue for Colorado CVC programs is shown in Figure 5 below. This is total state revenue deposited prior to deducting the amounts allocated to the District Attorney and Court Executive Administrative funds.

Colorado CVC Funds Available to Help Crime Victims

Local CVC funds paid statewide in FFY24 to help crime victims averaged \$1,510 per crime victim. This is for medical bills, mental health counseling, funerals, burials, lost wages, relocation – expenses that are directly related to a crime. Total FFY24 local revenue through the courts for Colorado CVC programs was \$6,026,999. Colorado CVC programs receive no general assembly funds to assist crime victims.

Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Victim Compensation (VC) Funds

VOCA VC grant funds are critical to ensure Colorado crime victims get help after a crime.

VOCA VC grant funds are distributed to each state from the federal Crime Victims Fund established by the 1984 Victims of Crime Act (VOCA). VOCA CVC grant funds come from criminal fines, forfeited bail bonds, penalty fees and special assessments collected by U.S. Attorney Offices, U.S. Courts and the Bureau of Prisons. The Office for Victims of Crime (OVC), situated within the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), allocates a percentage of these funds collected to state CVC programs.

The Office for Victims Programs (OVP), located within the Colorado Division of Criminal Justice (DCJ), serves as the state department designated to administer VOCA VC grant funds. The OVP is required to submit an annual VOCA VC grant application and state certification form to OVC providing data necessary to determine Colorado's VOCA VC allocation. In order to remain eligible to receive VOCA CVC grant funds, the OVP is also responsible for submitting quarterly and annual reports that adhere to the reporting requirements and procedures established by OVC. VOCA VC grant funds administered by OVP are regularly monitored and audited routinely, by both internal and external entities including OVC, the Office of Inspector General (OIG) and the federal Office of the Chief Financial Officer (OCFO). VOCA VC grant funds are contracted with OVC for a three federal fiscal year period. The OVP manages multiple VOCA VC grant contracts simultaneously to ensure that each grant award is fully expended within each grant period.

VOCA VC grant funds received fluctuate from year to year, depending upon the total amount of state CVC funds spent by local judicial districts. In 2021, Congress passed VOCA legislation which included changes resulting in significant increases in federal CVC supplemental grant funds to states. Most notably, the calculation used by OVC to determine Colorado's federal CVC grant award was changed from using 60% to using 75% of total allowable state CVC funds spent from the federal fiscal year two years prior to the current federal fiscal year. The other notable change was removing restitution collected from state CVC payments as revenue.

Colorado VOCA VC Grant Funds Overview

In Colorado, VOCA VC grant funds supplement the statutory criminal conviction surcharge fees collected in individual local judicial districts for CVC expenditures paid for tangible losses incurred by victims of crime. Supplemental VOCA VC grant funds are available to all 22 local judicial districts through a non-competitive application and award process.

VOCA VC Grant OVP Application and Award Process

The application and award process for VOCA CVC grant funds is non-competitive for local judicial districts seeking supplemental monies. The request to apply for VOCA VC grant funds begins with a conversation between the CVC Administrator at the local judicial district level and OVP.

A local judicial district may contact the OVP at any time to make inquiry regarding the availability of, and to initiate the application process for, VOCA CVC grant funds. This generally happens when a local judicial district CVC program's fund balance has decreased based upon the difference between the dollar amount of compensation funds being collected and the dollar amount of compensation funds being expended over a period of time. This may also happen when a local judicial district experiences an incident of mass violence resulting in the need for compensation assistance that exceeds, or will exceed, the local programs' available CVC funds.

OVP has put in place steps that ensure fair and equitable access for all judicial district CVC programs to apply for, and receive, VOCA VC grant funds. VOCA VC grant funds are considered and approved for a local judicial district CVC program utilizing the following information:

- 1. The CVC program's actual total revenue and expenditures for previous federal fiscal years;
- 2. Anticipation of a significant increase in CVC fund application requests, and;
- 3. The CVC program's actual fund balance at the end of a reporting quarter.

These steps are followed for both the initial determination of a VOCA VC grant fund award as well as requests for continued funding of a current award. The OVP moves forward applications for supplemental VOCA VC grant funds when a local judicial district CVC program's revenue, and actual fund balance, is decreasing (or is projected decrease).



VOCA VC grant award funds may be carried from one federal fiscal to the next federal fiscal year. For that reason, the amount of VOCA VC grant funds expended by each judicial district may be different than the total award amount above. VOCA VC grant funds are also be considered for short-term and/or emergency stabilization of CVC funds in a local judicial district, such as a mass violence incident or significant decrease in collections.

Antiterrorism and Emergency Assistance Program (AEAP) federal grant funds may be applied for from the Department of Justice, Office for Victims of Crime to supplement available resources and services to communities responding to terrorist attacks and mass violence. 

Figure 10 FFY24 Colorado CVC Claim Gender Demographics





Figure 11 FFY24 Colorado CVC Claim Age Demographics
