"As your children march out the door each day for school, there is really only one priority: **Nothing is more important than making sure they get home safely.** It's not surprising that kids aged 15 to 19 are the new demographic most likely to be hit by a car. Often, using a digital device while walking leads to these incidents. So, remember to advise your kids to keep their, '**Heads up and Phones Down!**'"

 - RH 6-8.10, requiring students to be able to read and comprehend history/social studies texts, independently and proficiently.
 - W.7, Conduct short as well as more sustained research projects based on focused questions, demonstrating understanding of the subject under investigation.

Teens Called Upon to Tackle Opioid Crisis through Video Competition

• The United States <u>Drug Enforcement Administration</u> (DEA), <u>DEA Educational Foundation</u> and <u>Discovery</u> <u>Education</u>, the leading provider of digital content and professional development for K-12 classrooms, are launching the <u>Operation Prevention Video Challenge</u> that gives students the power to send a message to their peers about the dangers of opioid misuse.

- The Operation Prevention Video Challenge invites teens across the country to create a unique 30-60 second public service announcement, aimed to reach other teens about this widespread issue. The question: "If your friends were going to watch ONE video that made them think twice about misusing prescription opioids, what would that video be?"

NEW NIJ Solicitation: Comprehensive School Safety Initiative (CSSI) Grant

- The <u>National Institute of Justice</u> is soliciting applications for CSSI funding in five categories.
- The first three are focusing on knowledge about what works to make schools safe using a tiered evidence approach. Increasing amounts of funding are awarded to programs of research according to their level of evidence effectiveness.
- The three categories focused on developing knowledge through this tiered evidence approach are:

NEW GLSEN Report Finds Hostile Environment for LGBTQ Youth in Colorado Schools

- "A national school climate survey shows that despite some progress, Colorado high schools remain 'hostile environments' for the many gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender and queer youth who continue to hear biased language and experience harassment, discrimination and assault.
- The <u>report</u>, released on January 11, 2017 by <u>GLSEN</u> the Gay, Lesbian and Straight Education Network includes the results of a 2015 school survey of more than 10,000 LGBTQ youth from all 50 states.
- The survey shows that rates of harassment and assault have decreased, and that schools nationwide have increased various support systems for queer and transgender youth.
- Still, the report says, "overall rates of homophobic and transphobic harassment are still higher than anyone should be willing to accept."

OJJDP Resource to Help Schools Implement Evidence-based Bullying Prevention

Information Released on Electronic Jamming Activities on College Campuses

- According to <u>National Center for Campus Public Safety</u>, The <u>Department of Homeland Security (DHS</u>), <u>Federal</u> <u>Communications Commission (FCC</u>), and law enforcement officials have noted an increase in electronic jamming activity.
- Electronic jamming can intentionally, or unintentionally, interfere with responder communications equipment leaving responders without vital communications and/or critical situational awareness, delay

emergency response times, escalate hazardous situations, result in loss of life, or facilitate illicit activities. Overall, jamming devices pose a threat to local and national security, leaving first responders vulnerable.

• <u>(UNCLASSIFIED) JOINT JAMMER INFOGRAPHIC</u> (PDF): This infographic informs of the effects of jamming and offers suggested mitigation tactics. If your department has been affected by jamming, please immediately report the suspected activity to the FCC as outlined in the infographic.

Study Results Released on Campus Sexual Violence

- The <u>National Center for Campus Public Safety</u> and the <u>American Association of Women in Community</u> <u>Colleges</u> published results of a study entitled "Challenges in Preventing and Responding to Sexual Violence at American Community Colleges."

NASPA Initiative Releases Results of Pilot Study

- In December , <u>NASPA: Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education</u> released a report that confirms the Culture of Respect Engagement (CORE) Blueprint Program, a program devoted to helping institutions to strengthen their response to and prevention of sexual violence on campus, is an effective model to address this issue in higher education.
- The <u>Culture of Respect CORE Blueprint Program: Findings From a National Pilot Study</u> (PDF) is the culmination of a year-long pilot study that included participation from 14 public and private institutions of higher education (IHEs). The pilot program was designed "to build campus stakeholders' capacity to make meaningful changes to policies and services, while engaging them in an ongoing process of feedback and reflection," from the <u>National Center for Campus Public Safety</u>.
