THE DIRECTOR'S CORNER

20th Anniversary of the Columbine Tragedy:

- As you know, in April we will commemorate the 20th anniversary of the tragedy at Columbine High School. News media professionals have already been preparing stories for the anniversary and this will create added stress for many survivors as well as others.
- The <u>National Association of School Psychologists</u> have prepared an excellent resource to help schools through this period. Please find the document <u>here.</u>
- With all the school tragedies that have occurred, many parents and students worry daily about safety at school. When speaking with the media, I have asked them to **highlight the MANY EFFORTS our** schools take every day to keep our students safe.
- This is a wonderful opportunity to remind your parents of steps your school/district has taken to safeguard students. Your district might want to prepare a newsletter that may include information on policies, practices and programs that contribute to both physical and psychological safety throughout the year. Some highlights of recent efforts might include (list things like: new bullying prevention programs; crisis and emergency plans and teams, staff training, school climate surveys, promotion of the Safe2Tell reporting line; mandatory visitor sign-ins at the office; ID badges for staff and students; periodic trauma-sensitive practice drills for students and staff; on-going communication and collaboration with local law enforcement, fire agencies, and other community partners, new equipment, and/or parent notification systems, etc.)
- It can't hurt to remind parents that student safety is everyone's job. Safe schools are free of bullying
 and harassment, free of crime and violence, free of weapons and free of drugs. Research tells us that
 safe schools contribute to the academic achievement of our students and everyone wants our schools
 to be positive and caring places. Invite your parents to sit on your school or district safety team so
 everyone has a voice in keeping schools safe.
- <u>Safe2Tell</u> reminds your multidisciplinary teams to prepare for an anticipated increase in Safe2Tell tips stemming from a heightened focus on school safety as well as the loss of life from these tragic events. COLORADO SCHOOL SAFETY RESOURCE CENTER NEWS

School Security Disbursement (SSD) Grant (SB18-269)

On February 13, the projects awarded under the SSD grant were <u>announced</u>. The grant review committee evaluated 95 applications that consisted of 305 individual projects. These projects ranged from fencing around a playground to sophisticated access control and surveillance equipment. The total request for the 305 individual projects was just shy of \$60 million. Therefore the grant of \$29.5 million was not able to come close to covering all the safety and security needs of Colorado schools.

It would be wonderful if the 2019 Colorado General Assembly could find funding to repeat this grant. IF the money is made available again, here are a few reminders that might help those writing the grants:

- Any type of door barricade system is NOT fire code compliant and therefore ineligible for funding. Many districts asked for funding for compliant classroom locks and these are allowed.
- There are a number of excellent threat assessment trainings and trainers available. Please note, the CSSRC has done well over 100 four-hour training for school teams in Colorado and across the country and can supply a protocol for your district's use. The Center does these trainings at **no cost** to the school and will come to you. Simply contact <u>Brad.stiles@state.co.us</u> or <u>Dustin.hunter@state.co.us</u>.
- If your interoperable communication requests were not funded with the SSD grant, the second round of the SAFER (Interoperability) grant will be released this spring. **Don't hesitate to try again!**
