THE DIRECTOR'S CORNER

Greetings:

I want to thank everyone who took the time to join us for the **Speakers' Series** during Colorado Safe Schools Month. We hope you found it enlightening and enjoyable. **Please do not miss the other virtual trainings coming up later this month and in the future**. They are listed immediately after this section.

Please make a special note of the Student/Staff Summit for December 10th. We need school staff to gather groups of students for this online event. The topics were chosen by the CSSRC's youth council so we know it will prove interesting and educational for middle and high school students and their educators.

The Center has been asked by a number of people what trends the state is seeing in **suicide numbers during COVID-19.** Here is an encouraging statement from CDPHE's Office of Suicide Prevention:

"During the COVID-19 (fatality data is available through July 2020), Colorado has not seen a statistically significant change in suicide rates across the age span compared with previous years, according to state mortality data. This holds true for youth (ages 10-24) suicide rates, as well.

It is difficult to predict the impact of COVID-19 on suicide rates. While the pandemic has left some individuals in a heightened state of isolation, others feel more connected to their families or communities as a result of changes to daily routines.

It is important for suicide prevention to continue to mitigate the risk factors that could contribute to someone feeling suicidal and to bolster protective factors that reduce the likelihood of someone feeling suicidal or attempting to die by suicide. Crucial to a comprehensive suicide prevention approach is understanding how various crises, including COVID-19, can impact both risk and protective factors. Regardless of whatever crisis is in front of us, we should continue to strengthen economic supports, strengthen access and delivery of culturally appropriate and affirming suicide care, create protective environments, and promote connectedness."

The Center is also pleased to continue to receive interest in the **threat assessment grant work.** The grant does not end until September 30, 2022, so there is still plenty of time to schedule training under that project. We have been working closely with the Governor's Office of Information Technology and our grantees will be testing the online version of the threat assessment protocol shortly.

Our hearts go out to all the students and staff who have lost loved ones from the virus or needed to evacuate due to the wildfires. I know Thanksgiving will look very differently for families this year but we still wish everyone peace, safety, and good health over the holiday.

STILL RECRUITING CSSRC STOP Grant: Threat Assessment Training & Implementation

- The CSSRC is recruiting 30 more sites for threat assessment training and implementation
- We need sites where CSSRC staff have NOT trained in threat assessment as well as a few where we have trained in the past.
- The lift for school sites is minimal just training evaluations to complete along with the training and a brief collection of data every six months.
- We also realize that adding another project to your school's work may be overwhelming right now. Please know that the grant project continues until 9/30/2022. If you believe you might be interested later in the process, please call to get your district/school on the list now.
- Staff can be paid stipends for the training and data collection under the grant.
- This final training phase of the grant will extend from September 2020 through August 2021.
- CSSRC staff have been working with the Governor's Office of Information Technology and will be piloting a secure, on-line protocol with the remaining sites. Schools will be able to store their assessments and track the at-risk students' Response Management Plans with automatic notifications for review meetings among other features. This will be available free of charge to districts even when the grant work is completed.

- Shortly after releasing their call for FY 21 Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Projects, the decision was made to earmark approximately \$2M of \$7M available for grants to support communities experiencing hardships due to COVID.
- Specifically and for the first time ever, CDOT will accept applications from communities meeting the criteria outlined below without the normally required 20% match.
