THE DIRECTOR'S CORNER


Dear Colleagues:

Exciting News - SAFER is Here!

The Office of School Safety has launched the RFP for this year's School Access for Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant Program.

- SB23-241 has made \$4,850,000 available to schools for interoperable communication hardware, software, equipment maintenance and training to allow for seamless communications between existing school communications systems and first responder communications systems. SSD Grant- Congratulations are in Order!

The State of Colorado's legislature allocated \$16,000,000 for the <u>Fiscal Year 2024 School Security Disbursement (SSD) Grant Program.</u> Please use the previous link to see the complete list of awardees. The Colorado Office of School Safety received 125 grant applications for a total requested amount of just over \$43,000,000. For this round of the School Security Disbursement grant 66 applicants were selected to receive funding as directed by <u>SB23-241</u>. Thank you to all of those who applied for the FY2024 SSD.

Resources for Schools Amidst Recent Threats

- In early January, hundreds of schools across the country reported receiving bomb threats.

REMINDER Naloxone (Narcan) Bulk Purchases

Students Experimenting with Fire: A Message from the CO Division of Fire Prevention and Control

- The <u>Division of Fire Prevention and Control (DFPC)</u> wants to support you, your staff, and your students. Did you know that a student usually starts multiple fires before getting caught? Experimenting with fire without adult supervision requires professional intervention, as these fires could stem from curiosity, crisis, thrill-seeking, willful destruction/delinquency, or mental health needs.
- To maximize public safety, please remember the following:
 - Reporting fire-related incidents is a requirement and the responsibility of principals/administrators;
 - Reporting an unwanted fire on school grounds or under school control is required by law; and
 - In addition to the local fire jurisdiction, ALL fire incidents on school property (regardless of intent, magnitude of fire, or age of the person(s) involved) need to be reported to the Division of Fire Prevention and Control using this <u>Fire Reporting</u> <u>Form</u>.
- <u>DFPC</u> can refer youth who demonstrate firesetting behaviors to Youth Firesetting Intervention Specialists (YFIS), who are specially trained members of the Fire Service. They do not use scare tactics, and youth who have gone through a YFIS program have very low recidivism rates.

Resilience Strategies for Institutions of Higher Education Hybrid Training
