- New Grant Opportunity: The Office of School Safety/Grants Unit has launched the RFP for this year's School Security Disbursement Grant (SSD).
 - SB23-241 has made \$16Million available to schools for various safety and security measures. Please <u>visit the OSS website for information on how to apply.</u>
 - Applications are due by 5:00 PM/MT on Monday, January 8, 2024.

- The Office of School Safety (OSS) is pleased to announce hiring of the following staff:

 - Kathleen Keelan, recently retired from Mapleton School District with over 30 years experience in education, mental health and school leadership. She is passionate about helping students and staff grow and succeed. She too will serve in the Crisis Response Unit.
 - Chamone Jones will start with the Office of School Safety on Monday, December 4th as a Grants Specialist in the OSS Grants Unit. Chamone brings a wealth of knowledge in program compliance and pre and post awards. She enjoys giving back to the community and is looking forward to helping local schools and youth organizations through the administration of grants.
 - Chelsey Lehmkuhl will represent Northeast Colorado as the Regional Training Consultant for the CSSRC. Based in Sterling, she has worked for RE-1 Valley Schools for the last several years as their Social-Emotional Learning Specialist. Before that, she served as the School-based Mental Health Coordinator for the Northeast Colorado Board of Cooperative Educational Services.
- Positions still open include:
 - One spot for a Crisis Response Specialist. This position will work with school
 personnel to assist in preparing for critical incidents and will respond to these
 incidents when requested. This staff will be trained in the PREPaRE Model of crisis
 response as well as other crisis models. This position will also be on-call to
 respond to crisis situations around the state when additional assistance is
 requested. Apply for the <u>Crisis Response Specialist position</u>.

- Hiring is underway for Regional Training Consultants in the Northwest and Southwest.
- The Youth Violence Prevention Grant, established with <u>SB23-241</u>, allocated one million dollars for school or community violence prevention and intervention projects. The OSS received 42 grant applications with a request for close to \$4.5 million. Thanks to everyone who applied. The twelve recipients are in the chart below:

NEW SRO Supervisors' Training

- The Office of School Safety will hold a NASRO Supervisors' Training in collaboration with the annual CASRO Summer Conference on June 10th, 11th and 12th at Keystone.
- This opportunity is provided by a Bureau of Justice grant secured by the OSS. This means that the grant funds will cover the cost of the NASRO training fee, hotels, per diems and mileage for SRO Supervisors.
- It is a contract with NASRO and not open to anyone outside of Colorado so it will NOT be

New Opportunity - Project Unite

- The staff of the CSSRC, along with partners from the Center for the Study and Prevention of Violence and CDE, have been trained for a new NASRO course called Project Unite: The Four Integrated Systems of School Violence Prevention.
- This training provides instruction on each key violence prevention system, and best practices for implementation.
- Modules include group discussion and team exercises to assist multidisciplinary school safety teams as they assess their current school safety systems and identify gaps and areas for improvement.
- Time is allotted for school safety teams to develop a violence prevention action plan in support of safety for their school.
- Upon completion of this course, multidisciplinary school safety teams will possess knowledge to implement violence prevention initiatives using a systems approach and be equipped with an actionable plan and next steps for strengthening their own school's safety. Participants will also receive a participant manual containing tools and resources to assist in planning and implementation efforts.
- The training is 16-hours or two days which could be split over a period of time.
- It is intended for school safety teams including an administrator, SRO or community law enforcement partner, school mental health professional and anyone else on the school's safety team.
- We are in the process of recruiting sites to present this program under a BJA STOP Violence grant.
- If participants attend outside of their contract time, compensation at their normal rate is available.

Networking Groups for Threat Assessment and Suicide Prevention Professionals

- For the last few years, the CSSRC has facilitated informal meetings for any school staff who oversee either suicide prevention and intervention or threat assessments in their buildings. - The Threat Assessment Professionals group will only be for staff who have attended our Colorado Threat Assessment and Management Protocol (CTAMP) training and those trained under the STOP Grant - We have set these professional meetings for the second Tuesday of the month. NEW Experimental Program: Invent2Prevent(I2P)

- Invent2Prevent (I2P) is an experiential program that challenges high school and university students to create and implement peer-developed initiatives, products and tools to prevent targeted violence, hate crimes and terrorism. The program allows essential prevention work to happen at the state and local level with the goal using a public health-informed approach to reducing risk factors and increasing protective factors within youth.
- The program is free of charge and sponsored by the <u>DHS Center for Prevention Programs</u> and <u>Partnerships</u>. Invent2Prevent is managed by <u>EdVenture Partners</u> and <u>McCain Institute</u>, who work with students throughout the entire project period in a guiding, mentoring, and coaching capacity.
- Five students, the faculty and a chaperone from each of the top three high school teams are awarded an all-expense trip to Washington, DC to present to DHS leadership and compete for \$9,000 in prize money. Graduating seniors are eligible to apply for scholarship money.
- Thirty-five spots will be made available to high schools for the spring 2024 academic period on a first-come first-served basis.

- The hotline does not provide legal advice or serve as an avenue for an individual to file a
 petition for a temporary order. It also does not advise callers on the consequences related
 to the filing or false filing of a petition for a temporary Extreme Risk Protection Order.
- The hotline may refer callers to the appropriate venue to file the order for further information concerning the results of filing the order.

Apply for Safer Internet Day 2024 Grants for Teachers and Community Groups

- If you are or know an educator or are part of a community nonprofit, ConnectSafely is offering grants of up to \$1,000 to help educators and youth-serving community organizations implement a student program or classroom activity for Safer Internet Day, an annual global celebration where everyone is empowered to use technology responsibly, respectfully, critically and creatively.

Grants Awarded to the Help Expand the Number of School Psychologists and School Social Workers in Colorado

- <u>University of Colorado Denver</u>, <u>University of Northern Colorado</u>, <u>University of Denver</u> school psychology programs, and <u>Poudre School District</u>, in cooperation with Colorado State University's school social work program, were awarded <u>federal grants</u> to help address the nation's mental health crisis.
- <u>University of Colorado Denver's Project ASPIRE</u> will support diverse school psychology students to serve high-need schools using equity-focused mental health practices, emphasizing serving bilingual, early childhood, and low-income children populations in partnership with Denver Public Schools.
- <u>University of Denver's SPIRIT program</u> will recruit and train school psychologists in Colorado's rural communities.
- <u>University of Northern Colorado's program</u> will focus on training school psychology graduates working within rural districts or Spanish-speaking populations.

 The Bureau of Justice Statistics, in the Department of Justice's Office of Justice Programs, and the National Center for Education Statistics, in the Department of Education's Institute of Education Sciences, today released Report on Indicators of School Crime and Safety: 2022, which includes Indicator 2: Incidence of Victimization at School and Away From School. This report is the 25th in a series of annual publications produced jointly by

- BJS and NCES.
- "The 2021 rate of nonfatal criminal victimization that occurred at school for students ages 12-18 (7 victimizations per 1,000 students) represents a decrease from 2019 (30 victimizations per 1,000 students)," noted Kevin M. Scott, Principal Deputy Director of BJS.
- The <u>report</u> provides official estimates of school crime and safety from a variety of data sources, including national surveys of students, teachers, principals, and post-secondary institutions. It presents data on different types of student victimization, measures of school conditions, and student perceptions about their personal safety at school. Indicator 2: Incidence of Victimization at School and Away From School includes data from BJA's National Crime Victimization Survey. Each of the 23 indicators is presented separately, and all indicators can be found on the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) website.

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SPOTLIGHT: Preventing and Recovering from Gun-Related Violence on Campus

- The National Center on Safe Supportive Learning Environments released the following: Gun-related violence on campus threatens the safe, supportive learning environments that students need to live and learn. Despite reports of gun-related violence at institutions of higher education (IHEs), there are no accurate estimates on the prevalence of overall gun-related violence at institutions of higher education (IHEs), according to PBS NewsHour. No federal agency tracks gun violence specific to IHE campuses, and it is difficult to define where a campus ends and the surrounding community begins. However, data do exist on mass shootings (defined as an event where four or more people are killed in public during a single incident) at IHEs. The Violence Project database shows that there have been nine mass shootings on campuses since 1966.
- The fear of mass shootings, regardless of their prevalence, negatively impacts campus communities. Sixty-five percent of college students say that gun violence affects their feelings of safety. IHEs have a duty to protect students from harming themselves and others and can take action to help keep campuses safe. The resources below can help IHE administrators understand how to prevent gun violence in higher education settings and help students, faculty, and staff recover from incidents of gun-related violence.
