THE DIRECTOR'S CORNER

- ★ The Office of School Safety (OSS) has an exciting training opportunity for school safety teams in the metro Denver area. On August 27th and 28th the OSS will be partnering with the National Association of School Resource Officers and Aurora Public Schools to provide Project Unite training. This training provides instruction on:
 - (1) positive school culture and climate
 - (2) bystander reporting and response
 - (3) information sharing, and
 - (4) behavioral threat and suicide assessment and management with best practices for implementation.

Modules include group discussions and team exercises to assist multidisciplinary school safety teams as they assess their current school safety systems and identify gaps and areas for improvement. Time is allotted for school safety teams to develop a violence prevention action plan in support of safety for their school.

If your team has attended any of CDE's summer Enhancing School Safety Regional Training: Integrating Prevention and School Climate Improvement Efforts, this two-day workshop would be a great next step for enhancing the work of your school safety teams. But others are encouraged to attend too.

 The State of Colorado's legislature allocated \$4,850,000 for the <u>Fiscal Year 2025 School</u> <u>Access for Emergency Response Grant Program</u>. The Colorado Office of School Safety received 20 eligible grant applications for a total requested amount of \$10,000,000.00.
For this round of the School Access for Emergency Response grant 10 applicants (19 school districts) were selected to receive funding as directed by <u>SB23-241</u>. Thank you to all of those who applied for the FY2025 SAFER.

Feedback from the Staff at Boys and Girls Club Metro Denver:

The Colorado Dream Foundation (CDF) serves over 420 youth and their families from 32 Title I schools in the Green Valley Ranch, Montbello, Through the support of the Colorado Office of School Safety, Broncos Boys & Girls Club held our annual March for Peace!

The March for Peace is an event crafted by Broncos Boys & Girls Club members, most notably Club member Rae Rae and the Colorado Youth of the Year 2024 recipient Nashara, and brought to life with the support of our staff! Created in response to the growing violence in the Montbello neighborhood in 2020, this event is intended to carve a space within the Montbello community for people of all ages and backgrounds to come together and connect in a positive and meaningful way.

March for Peace stands as a testament to the strength of the community and the optimism of the Club members at the helm. Participants foster relationships with others who share the goal of promoting peace and understanding as well as physical and mental wellness.

This year, the March for Peace drew together nearly 300 people from the Montbello community including Club members, families, and community members! During this event, participants walked/ran a 5k route and then stayed to participate in the events held post-race! Exciting events for the community included bubble foam pits for people to walk through, a bounce house, fitness games, face painting, a balloon animal vendor, a breakfast bar, a shaved ice stand, a cake stand and over 20 community vendors!

Among the vendors that participated was Colorado Public Safety, Colorado Young Leaders, Pan Jujitsu, and a Fitness Carnival! The most notable moment from this event was seeing the leadership of Nashara and Rae Rae, the two Club members that coordinated this event. Their leadership, coordination, problem solving, and overall disposition throughout the March for Peace was truly remarkable! They took full responsibility for the management of this event, hosting the nearly 300 people and 20 community vendors, while Club staff supported their requests. This is a testament to the lifelong leadership skills that Boys & Girls Clubs of Metro Denver nurtures among young people we serve organization-wide, supporting their success that foreshadows their bright futures ahead!

The impact that Boys & Girls Clubs of Metro Denver had within the community of Montbello through this event, was not possible without the Youth Violence Prevention Grant opportunity provided by the Office of School Safety. Our organization is truly grateful for this meaningful collaboration and looks forward to any future opportunities! CDF used grant funding to deliver free mental health services to 105 youth as well as out-of-school time programming for 177 youth consisting of STEAM learning academic enrichment, mental health services, and social-emotional learning support. By implementing a social-emotional learning curriculum designed to reduce the likelihood of youth becoming involved in gun violence, the foundation teaches young people self-awareness and self-advocacy skills to manage anxiety, depression, and grief, thus increasing prosocial behavior across various environments.

NEW Healthy Kids Colorado 2023 Survey Results Released

CDPHE releases the latest Healthy Kids Colorado Survey data: Responses offer signs of resilience among Colorado students

- The <u>Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment</u> released the latest statewide and regional results from the Healthy Kids Colorado Survey, the state's most comprehensive survey on the health and well-being of young people. More than 120,000 youth responded to the voluntary survey in the fall of 2023, and the results are promising.
- "We're very happy to see overall improvements in many areas. There have been dramatic changes in the right direction around indicators of mental health, suicide risk, and substance use," said Jill Hunsaker Ryan, executive director, CDPHE. "We're hopeful this is an indication of state and community investments in prevention programming and protective factors paying off."
- Between 2021 and 2023 high schoolers experiencing persistent feelings of sadness or hopelessness dropped by 14 percentage points. While these are the lowest rates in

Colorado since the survey's inception, we remain committed to connecting youth with the help and support they need to further decrease the rate of youth who have suicidal thoughts, planning, and attempts.

Significant key findings from the 2023 statewide high school results include:

- Youth who seriously considered suicide in the last year decreased by 6 percentage points.
- Youth who planned a suicide attempt decreased by 4 percentage points.
- Youth who attempted suicide decreased by 1 percentage point.
- Similar to prior years, the Healthy Kids Colorado Survey results consistently illuminate disparities in health outcomes for LGBTQ+ youth in Colorado. Disaggregated 2023 high school data show:
- Transgender youth seriously considered suicide in the past year at more than four times the rate of their cisgender peers (45% vs.10%).
- Nonbinary youth seriously considered suicide in the past year at more than three times the rate of their female and male peers (37% vs. approx. 10%).
- Bisexual, gay/lesbian, pansexual, and asexual youth seriously considered suicide in the past year at more than three times the rate of their heterosexual peers (approx. 29% vs.8%).
- "We hope to build on some of the positive trends coming out of the survey to close the gaps we see for LGBTQ+ youth in Colorado," said Lena Heilmann, director of the Office of Suicide Prevention. "Protective factors, such as supportive adults, clear family rules, and feeling safe and connected at school, help youth to thrive."
- The 2021 results highlighted sharp declines in youth substance use. This trend continued into 2023 with decreases in current use of most substances. Youth marijuana use and cigarette use remained stable between 2021 and 2023 at 13% and 3%, respectively.
- Youth who currently drink alcohol decreased by 3 percentage points.
- Youth who currently vape decreased by 7 percentage points.
- Youth who currently use prescription pain medications without a prescription or differently than prescribed decreased by 2 percentage points.
- The latest middle school results show similar improvements in mental health and suicide outcomes, but a concerning increase in youth alcohol use. In 2023, 24% of middle schoolers reported ever drinking alcohol, up from 11% in 2021. Early initiation of substance use is associated with future substance misuse. In 2023, 14% of middle schoolers reported having their first alcoholic drink before age 11, almost triple the rate from 2021 (5%).
- The Colorado School of Public Health Survey Team within the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus helps schools administer the survey in the fall of odd-numbered years. In 2023, 120,239 students participated in 344 public middle and high schools in 46 Colorado counties. CDPHE and the Colorado Departments of Human Services, Education, and Public Safety support this survey. 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NEW Title IX Regulations Released

- <u>The U.S. Department of Education</u> has finally released its new Title IX regulation.
- The rule enforces the promise of Title IX that no person experiences sex discrimination in federally funded education.
- This will also help ensure that all persons, including students and employees, will receive the appropriate support if they were to experience sex discrimination in schools and that the procedures created by schools for investigating and resolving complaints involving sex discrimination are accurate and fair to all parties.
- Some of the final regulations include
 - $\circ~$ Providing full protection from sex-based harassment.
 - Requiring schools to take prompt and effective action to end any sex discrimination in their education programs or activities as well preventing any recurrence and remedy the effects.
 - Requiring schools to provide supportive measures to those affected by conduct that may represent sex discrimination, including sexual violence and other forms of sexual harassment.
