The course explains the threat assessment process and why parent/guardian collaboration is so very important. We have now created a <u>flyer that you can share with your community.</u>

New Opportunity - Project Unite

• The staff of the CSSRC, along with partners from the Center for the Study and Prevention of Violence and CDE, will be trained in November for a new NASRO course called *Project Unite: The Four Integrated Systems of School Violence*

Prevention.

- This training provides instruction on each key violence prevention system, and best practices for implementation.
- Modules include group discussion and team exercises to assist multidisciplinary school safety teams as they assess their current school safety systems and identify gaps and areas for improvement.
- Time is allotted for school safety teams to develop a violence prevention action plan in support of safety for their school.
- Upon completion of this course, multidisciplinary school safety teams will possess knowledge to implement violence prevention initiatives using a systems approach and be equipped with an actionable plan and next steps for strengthening their own school's safety. Participants will also receive a participant manual containing tools and resources to assist in planning and implementation efforts.
- The training is 16-hours or two days which could be split over a period of time.
- It is intended for school safety teams including an administrator, SRO or community law enforcement partner, school mental health professional and anyone else on the school's safety team.
- \circ $\,$ We are in the process of recruiting sites to present this program.
- If participants attend outside of their contract time, compensation at their normal rate is available.

- The hotline does not provide legal advice or serve as an avenue for an individual to file a petition for a temporary order. It also does not advise callers on the consequences related to the filing or false filing of a petition for a temporary Extreme Risk Protection Order.
- The hotline may refer callers to the appropriate venue to file the order for further information concerning the results of filing the order.

Grants Awarded to the Help Expand the Number of School Psychologists and School Social Workers in Colorado

- Intuitive Navigation: Special attention was required in this aspect, as the needs and preferences of foster care users significantly differ from those seeking information about the signs of child abuse or the number for the CO4Kids Child Abuse and Neglect Hotline.
- Responsive Layout: As the majority of people who visit the Co4Kids site do so via their mobile device, <u>the new site</u> was designed to be completely mobile responsive from large monitors to the smallest of mobile devices.
- Spanish Feature (Coming Soon): The website ensures a seamless experience for Spanish-speaking users in locating the information they require. A straightforward toggle option is readily available in the top right-hand corner, and the CDHS team can effortlessly input and manage the Spanish content.

REMINDER Colorado Health and Safety Regulations for Schools

- In all other counties, the CDPHE delegates this authority to the local public health agency.
- Some counties inspect schools on a routine basis, while others respond to complaints only.

The Bureau of Justice Statistics Releases Report on Indicators of School Crime and Safety

- The Bureau of Justice Statistics, in the Department of Justice's Office of Justice Programs, and the National Center for Education Statistics, in the Department of Education's Institute of Education Sciences, today released <u>Report on Indicators of School Crime and Safety: 2022</u>, which includes Indicator 2: Incidence of Victimization at School and Away From School. This report is the 25th in a series of annual publications produced jointly by BJS and NCES.
- "The 2021 rate of nonfatal criminal victimization that occurred at school for students ages 12-18 (7 victimizations per 1,000 students) represents a decrease from 2019 (30 victimizations per 1,000 students)," noted Kevin M. Scott, Principal Deputy Director of BJS.
- The <u>report</u> provides official estimates of school crime and safety from a variety of data sources, including national surveys of students, teachers, principals, and post-secondary institutions. It presents data on different types of student victimization, measures of school conditions, and student perceptions about their personal safety at school. Indicator

2: Incidence of Victimization at School and Away From School includes data from BJS's National Crime Victimization Survey. Each of the 23 indicators is presented separately, and all indicators can be found on the <u>National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) website</u>.

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SPOTLIGHT: Preventing and Recovering from Gun-Related Violence on Campus

- The National Center on Safe Supportive Learning Environments released the following: Gun-related violence on campus threatens the safe, supportive learning environments that students need to live and learn. Despite reports of gun-related violence at institutions of higher education (IHEs), there are no accurate estimates on the prevalence of overall gun-related violence at institutions of higher education (IHEs), according to PBS News Hour. No federal agency tracks gun violence specific to IHE campuses, and it is difficult to define where a campus ends and the surrounding community begins. However, data do exist on mass shootings (defined as an event where four or more people are killed in public during a single incident) at IHEs. The Violence Project database shows that there have been nine mass shootings on campuses since 1966.
- The fear of mass shootings, regardless of their prevalence, negatively impacts campus communities. <u>Sixty-five percent of college students</u> say that gun violence affects their feelings of safety. IHEs have a duty to protect students from harming themselves and others and can take action to help keep campuses safe. The resources below can help IHE administrators understand how to prevent gun violence in higher education settings and help students, faculty, and staff recover from incidents of gun-related violence.

JED's New Postvention Consulting Services

- JED is offering a new set of services to campus communities that experience a loss of life to suicide or another tragic event. JED's postvention consulting services will help your school respond rapidly, responsibly, and compassionately to the needs of your students and staff. JED experts are able to provide support proactively to ensure maximum preparedness or in real-time in immediate response to a crisis. Learn more about JED's postvention consulting services.
- JED's <u>It's OK to Say Suicide</u> campaign was featured in an <u>article</u> by Sinclair Broadcast Group, which has affiliate TV stations across more than 30 states and reaches a potential 23 million people. The article features an interview with Ellen Utley, a psychiatrist and JED advisor to independent and boarding schools and several resources for suicide awareness and prevention.
